NEW YORK, November 7.—At 10 o'clock Secretary Fessenden announced from the balcony of the Fifth Avenue hotel that Blaine had carried New York by 1000, and he would take his seat. The democratic committee issued a manifesto declaring Cleveland elected and that he will be inaugurated. The Tribune still claims Blaine elected.

ALBANY, N. Y., November 7, 22:00 p. m.—To Melville P. Stone, editor of the Chicago News:—It is now conceded that the official returns from all the counties in this state give Cleveland about 1,500 plurality.

REPUBLICAN CONFIDENCE. Special Telegram to THE BEE.

CHICAGO, November 7, 12:30 p. m.—The following dispatch was received by General Logan to-night from Assistant Secretary Dawson of the republican national committee: Republican Headquarters New York, 3 p. m.: A careful revision by Colonel Grosvener of the returns from all election districts but four which are yet to be heard from, gives us a plurality of 1,500 in the state. I feel confident of result and any attempt to fraud will be detected and defeated.

NEW YORK, November 8, 1:35 p. m.—On a careful review of the districts, as furnished by the agents of the Associated press, corrected by their returns, received during the day, so as to bring the record down to this time the total vote of the state stands for Cleveland 539,886, Blaine 508,425. Thirty-four of Cleveland, 1,400. There are yet 18 districts from which returns are still behind, or questioned. These in 1884 gave Garfield a plurality of 836. These counties in which are the following districts: Essex, Madison, Saratoga, Sullivan and Ulster.

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. NEW YORK, November 7.—Soon—Owing to the diversified opinion as to the correctness and manner in which the returns from this state have been received and tabulated by the Associated press, it has invited a committee from both the democratic and republican national and state organizations and the newspapers of the city to visit the offices this afternoon and examine the returns, as received from the various districts throughout the state and also the mode of tabulating them, and to assist in retabulating them. The Tribune still claims that Blaine has carried the state. Printing house square, in front of Broadway, is packed with people. The returns received by the Associated Press from four more districts will indicate that, if vote received by districts is correct, Blaine's plurality in the state will be about 100, while the vote by counties, which as received will indicate a reversal of these figures, giving Cleveland about 1000.

CROWDED CORRIDORS. NEW YORK, November 7, 4 a. m.—The scenes about the hotels and political headquarters town last night were exciting everywhere, but at the national democratic headquarters police men were to be seen. People surged through the corridors of the hotels and filled the bars. Nothing was to be heard on any side but "Blaine" and "Cleveland." Fighting continued but odds favored Cleveland.

TWELVE UNIFORMED POLICEMEN were on duty near the Western Union building last evening. Capt. Berghold, of the 78th precinct, said nobody had requested the police to be on duty, but he had taken the step as a precautionary measure. He withdrew them soon after midnight as the crowd seemed to be on the wane for their presence was not needed. A few men marched down Broadway to the Western Union building just before midnight.

Resolutions in accordance with the above were adopted, after Aaron Z. Vanderpool, Carter, Butler, Candish, and Whitney had discussed the election laws and the mode of canvassing the returns, and the action as they saw fit in relation to the vote of New York, Kings, Queens, Suffolk and Richmond counties.

THE TRIBUNE'S NEW ESTIMATES. Blaine has a plurality in the state of 1,114 votes. The Tribune returns from all but two counties show Cleveland 1,576 plurality. The Star's revised figures from a total of 69 counties make Cleveland's plurality 1,235.

THE KING—INTERESTING INSIDE FIGURES. Special Telegram to THE BEE.

NEW YORK, November 7, 12:30 p. m.—With two precincts to hear from, Cleveland is ahead about 600 in the state.

NOON.—The election of Cleveland is assured, and the only question is as to the plurality in the state, which will hardly exceed 1,000. This is not yet conceded by the Tribune, which paper has just telephoned an answer to an inquiry as follows: "We sense nothing." In this morning's issue morning they say: "Victory. The figures justify our belief that Blaine and Logan are elected by the vote of New York, Indiana and the southern states, of which there are 23, and only a few votes in the state are needed to elect Blaine. This belief is based upon the returns as collected by the Associated press from every voting precinct in the state except two, which we have carefully revised as far as possible by special dispatches. These returns, returns giving the vote of 3,309 for Blaine, 2,977 for Cleveland, and a plurality of 371 for Blaine. The precincts not yet heard from gave a plurality of 780 county precincts marked. In these scattered returns for some time past and it is impossible that these data be less than 1,000 plurality in the present republican plurality of 1,100. An-

suming the accuracy of the Associated press dispatches and tabulation, the election of Blaine and Logan can no longer be a matter of reasonable doubt. But the dispatches also indicate that the republicans have carried all the other northern states except Connecticut. New Jersey, possibly Indiana, and have a probability of success in West Virginia and Florida, which would insure the election of Blaine and Logan even without the vote of New York.

But this editorial was in type before the issuance of the Associated press bulletin between 2 and 3 o'clock this morning giving the state by nearly 1,000 to Cleveland. The business men have postponed their meeting call from the treasury steps this afternoon with the knowledge that there is to be no counting out on either side. The Tribune claim is a game of bluff and disguise the republicans and since the actual returns have come in only amuses the democrats. Yesterday it excited their disgust and indignation. Official returns are received completely from all except twelve counties and very close figures on the missing counties show that the result is beyond question. In every instance the official returns have increased Cleveland's plurality. Jay Gould's congratulatory dispatch to Governor Cleveland this morning settled all doubt for Gould is known to have had the earliest and best information of the state returns. This congratulatory raised a yell in Wall street, and those who were in the street immediately began to cheer. The bulletin boards were surrounded by thousands, and even up to 10 o'clock today they were carefully watched, but when the sun and others began to take down their display canvas the excitement settled into conviction. The excitement is now over and affairs have about resumed their normal course.

STABBED TO DEATH. NEW YORK, November 7.—A crowd of people were cheering last night in Brooklyn for Cleveland and Hendricks, when Patrick Bray, inspector of sewers, and Patrick Cunningham, a driver, closed in on the crowd and they were set upon by the crowd and both were stabbed. Bray's wound is fatal. No arrests.

ANOTHER DEMOCRATIC MANIFESTO. NEW YORK, November 7.—The official democratic committee has issued the following address: "The national democratic committee has taken every precaution to insure the prompt returns in all delayed and doubtful districts. Counsel are employed to watch the official canvass and arrangements are made to insure the prompt returns of every vote over the country. To meet the expense of this action, which are necessarily heavy, friends in various sections are starting subscriptions. Money will be thankfully received by the national committee, and any aid of this nature to assist in enforcing the popular will should, to be effective, be promptly rendered."

ANOTHER REPUBLICAN MANIFESTO. NEW YORK, November 7.—The republican national committee says "That Blaine is coming to New York for a conference with them." They say that the republican national committee had a plurality of about 1,000 in this state. The vote will not vary 200 on either side of the figures. New York gives Cleveland 40,000 more votes than Blaine. The republican party has devoted all its energy toward securing another result. It now reluctantly admits that the election has been decided differently from what it was expected. The republican party has decided to transfer the federal administration to the democratic party as they are glad that the decision has been made in favor of a democrat from New York state.

BROOKLYN'S BOULDER BOOM. NEW YORK, November 7.—Brooklyn fired a hundred guns and had a great torch-light procession celebrating the election of Cleveland. Several hundred other towns had salutes.

DEMOCRATIC PROCLAMATION OF VICTORY. NEW YORK, November 7.—Headquarters of the national democratic committee, No. 11 Broadway, New York, this morning issued the following: "There can no longer be any question concerning the actual result of the presidential election. Grover Cleveland is elected President of the United States. It is not worth while for our adversaries to claim the electoral vote of the state of New York. It is also unnecessary for them to insist on the proper officers of election on the night of the 4th of November, showed a decisive plurality in the state as the election of Cleveland and Hendricks. If any different or altered returns are being prepared or are promulgated they are correct reflections of the records of the National Convention and the men siding and settling the making of such reports are criminals. It is not expected that you will tamely submit to the machinery of fraud.
