Loof bourew Not Defeated After All.

A Mistake in the Fourth Ward,

Ever since the election there has been all sorts of figuring on the office of district judge, but it has of late been generally conceded that Judge Aylesworth had defeated Judge Loofbourow by three majority. It now appears that errors discovered will give Judge Loofbourow a clerical error, certified up votes for Judge things well, and working out the salva-Loofbourow for the circuit bench instead

Some other minor errors have been discovered, which it is thought the state board which meets next Thursday will allow in Judge Loofbourow's favor, giving him a majority. An apparent error has been discovered in the returns of the Second ward of this city, which would be sufficient to overcome Judge Aylesworth's claimed majority of three. The returns show that Judge Aylesworth received 506 votes

and Judge Loofbourow 380, but the tally sheet shows that Judge Aylesworth had 497, and then in the next column, as if made by an afterthought, or some other way, there appear six more tallies, but even counting these six it makes only 503, while the figures carried out are 506. This three would reduce Judge Aylesworth to a tie with Judge Loofbourow. Another strange feature to the tally sheet is that the total number of votes for judge of the full term, was 886, while on the short term, to substitute any other name. It seems now that if the state board gets at all these errors and counts the votes as intended by the voters, Judge Loofbonrow would have a majority.
