DR. CROSS' CASE. The Prosecution Claims to Have Discovered Some New and Important Evidence.

It has been generally supposed that the case of Dr. Cross for the shooting of Dr. McKane would not come to trial at this term of the district court, but that it would be continued on account of the absence of witnesses, or sent on a change of venue to some other county, or otherwise delayed and put off. District Attorney Connor is preparing, however, for the trial of the case, and is getting his testimony in shape to make a strong presentation. It is claimed that two new witnesses have been found, who have not been before the grand jury, and yesterday notice of that fact was served on Dr. Cross. One of these witnesses is said to be William Reed, manager of the opera house at Chariton, Iowa. It is claimed that Reed was an eye-witness to the tragedy and that he is ready to testify that Dr. Cross began the quarrel, and after striking at Dr. McKane, shot him. If this is true Reed is a most important witness, and his evidence on the stand will prove a sensational feature.

The other witness is W. T. Trotter, a well-known resident of Avoca. It is claimed that he will testify that not long before the shooting of Dr. McKane, Dr. Cross made threats in Trotter's hearing, stating that he would shoot Dr. McKane on the first opportunity, and that he was waiting for a good chance to do so.

The discovery of this testimony will add new burdens to the defense, and will awaken fresh interest in the public, for the claims made as to what these witnesses will testify are decidedly against the claim of the defendant, that he shot simply in self-defense.

UPSET SALE AT METCALF BROS. DISSATISFIED DEMOCRATS. They Urge a Contest on the Election of District Judge.

There was a meeting yesterday at Bechtel's hotel, of members of the democratic committee of this judicial district, to take action in regard to the declared election of Judge Loofbourrow to the district bench, and the defeat of the democratic candidate, Judge E. E. Aylesworth. There were present at this conference Judge Comfort, of Crawford county, who served as chairman in the absence of Geo. A. Holmes, of this city, the regular chairman; C. J. H. Keatly, who served as secretary; T. W. Ivory, of Glenwood; A. B. Keith, of Denison; Eli Babcock, of Avoca; Mr. Jones, of Cass county, and Mayor Vaughan.

The following resolutions were presented by Col. Keatly and unanimously adopted: Whereas, Hon. E. E. Aylesworth, of Council Bluffs, was placed in nomination by the democracy and the greenbackers, by fusion, for the position of district judge of the Thirteenth judicial district of Iowa, for the term commencing on the 1st of January, 1885, and the Hon. C. F. Loofbourrow, by the republicans for the same office for the same term; and Whereas, Several of the officers of election in several of the precincts of Greene county, for the purpose of defeating the will of the people of this district in making a change in the judiciary of the name, in violation of law altered the returns and permitted tampering with the ballot boxes, and changed the apparent result; and whereas the state board of canvassers, with the exception of the governor, gave their approval to this unlawful manipulation of the poll lists and poll books, and went behind the returns first made from said county of Greene, in relation to said election precincts, and approved said unlawful alterations, and declared said Loofbourrow elected district judge of said district for the full term of four years, commencing January 1st, 1885, therefore,

Resolved, By the democratic committee for the Thirteenth judicial district of Iowa, assembled at Council Bluffs, on this 17th day of December, 1884, that we, hereby representing a majority of the district who cast their votes in said judicial contest, express our censure of the said election officers of said precincts, and of the majority of the state board of canvassers, for their action in attempting to defeat the manifest will of the majority of the voters of this district. That it is our deliberate judgment that the facts disclose sufficient grounds for Judge Aylesworth's making a legal contest in the courts, for the possession of said judicial office, in order that the will of the people concerning the same may have full effect, and we urge upon him the necessity and duty of making such a contest, and pledge him to that end, our most cordial cooperation, aid and assistance, so far as it is in our rightful power so to do. Messrs. Jones, Ivory and Babcock were appointed a committee to wait on Judge Loofbourrow and confer with him in regard to making up an agreed statement of facts to be submitted to some tribunal to determine the contest.
