the afternoon private advices were received
from the west that the railroad commis-
sioners of some states contemplated a reduction in
freight rates; it was also reported that the
trunk line passenger agents had been unable to
restore the rates at Chicago to-day. This
brought about a fresh selling movement and a
marked decline in prices, the greatest drop be-
ing 2 per cent in Chicago, Burlington & Quincy.
Near the close a firmer tone prevailed on
covering by small operators, and prices re-
flected 1/2 to 1/2. The market left off steady;
by Saturday's closing, prices are 1/2 to
3/4 lower, except Kansas & Texas, Missouri
Pacific and New York Central, which are 1/2
to 3/4 higher.

There seems to be a general stagnation in
the produce market. Jobbers are doing very
little, but this is partly accounted for because
of the near approach of the end of the month
and also the year. In view of these facts re-
tail dealers are buying very carefully, and do
not purchase any goods for which there is not
an immediate demand. The New Year's
trade does not bid fair to amount to any-
thing much. Turkeys are in fair
demand, and but very few are
in the market. They are quoted to day at 12
to 13 cents per pound. There are a good
many chickens in the market and are quoted
at 60 to 65 cents per pound. There seems to be
a more of a demand for apples than for any other

fruit at present. Prices advanced slightly
to-day and good apples are now quoted at
50 to 55 cents per bushel. All other produce is
very dull and will remain so until after the
beginning of the new year.

choice dairy, 16 1/2 to 18c; fair to good, 12 1/2 to 15c;
inferior grades, 10 to 12c.

Eggs—Receipts very light; price is advancing.
We quote to-day 25 cents and look for higher
prices before the first of the year.

this morning. A large stock is carried over from
last week and receipts to-day were quite
heavy. However, there is a good demand for
docks; turkeys and geese, which quit well
all be cleared up by night, and in all probability
will have no chance to accumulate again,
but chickens are again a drug in the market.
Well dressed yearlings, 12c; calves, 10c;
at 7c, but hard frozen, unshaped and bruised-
up stock find few buyers and has to go at a discount. In order to
maintain the price of the yearlings, a large stock
of the same is being put on the market, the same
being removed and fed out cut live.
Live poultry very dull and not advisable to ship.
