Stocks—The market in the first hour of business was irregular, but in the main strong. Near one p. m. there was a falling off in the volume of business and prices reacted 1 to 1 per cent. Late in the day there was a decided pressure to sell coal stocks, Pacific Mail and St. Paul, under which process the market dropped 1 to 2 per cent. Near the close Pacific Mail rallied to 55, but the market as a rule left off weak. Speculation was adversely affected this afternoon on reports of lower passenger rates to Chicago and a falling off in east bound shipments. Compared with last night's closing, prices are 1/16 per cent lower, except Canadian Pacific, Central Pacific, Northwest, Delaware & Hudson, Missouri Pacific and Omahas, which are 1 to 1 1/2 per cent higher.
