NEW YORK, February 24.—Money—Bett-
 ter request at 12½%, closing at 2 per cent.

Prime mercantile paper—4½%.

Starling Bills—Dull and heavy at 4½%; de-
 mand 4½%.

Governments—Quiet and strong with an
 advance of ½ per cent in four. Others un-
 changed.

Stocks—It was known before the opening
 of the stock exchange that there had been a
 material advance in American securities in
 the London market since Saturday, and this
 was used here as a basis for a small sized
 "boom." At first the prices on nearly every active stock on the list generally were 1½ to
 2 per cent higher. A sharp advance of 1½ per cent,
 the latter figure representing the ad-
 vance in Lackawanna, was followed by a
 moderate reaction and then higher prices again at the close, the market finally closing
 strong at 6½ per cent above Saturday last.
 The total business amounted to 321,
 518 shares, an increase of 8,000 over Saturday,
 notwithstanding the fact that there was one
 hour less in which to do business owing to the
 late opening following a holiday.
