What the People Will be Called Upon to] Decide.

The date fixed for the special election is Tuesday, March 10th. Two distinct propositions are to be then voted on, one as to whether the board shall build a new court house, the other as to whether they shall build a new jail.

The plans selected are those of Eckel

& Mann of St. Jos. It is proposed that for building the court house not more than \$150,000 bonds shall, under any circumstances, be issued, and as much less as the board can get the building erected for. These bonds are to be sold only in such sums as are needed by the progress of the work, sold for not less than par.
