A Young Drug Clerk Leaves the Central Hospital and Can Not be Found.

Last Thursday Lewis Gotling, a clerk in the drug store of John W. Bell, 820 South Tenth street, was attacked with hemorrhage of the lungs, and under instructions of Dr. Dara, who treated him, went to Central hospital. He had an other slight attack there on Friday, but aside from that seemed to be all right. However, at times some of the other patients thought they could notice something strange in the young man's actions. Several times Saturday he was telephoned from the store about certain prescriptions and where the several ingredients for them were to be found. This seemed queer. This command was obeyed, and very soon the party was standing, and cracked jokes freely with the other patients. During the day Dr. Dara told him that he ought to take more exercise or he would die. About half-past 9 o'clock Saturday night he walked out of the hospital, and has not been seen or heard of since. Becoming alarmed at his absence, a telephone message was sent to the drug store about 1 o'clock, but he had not been there. A searching party went out yesterday, but they got no idea of the missing man. It seems that he has been subject to funny spells heretofore, and was wont to go away for three or four days at a time, when no one knew where he would be. Mr. Gotling is an expert chemist, and a regular graduate from the pharmacy at Cincinnati. His home is in St. Joe, Mo., and it may be that there is where he has gone.

BY HIS BULL-DOG.

A Watchman at the B. & M. Freight Depot Shot Through the Thigh.

Saturday night, about 8 o'clock, James Champeney, a watchman at the B. & M. freight depot accidentally shot himself quite badly in the upper part of his right thigh. The accident occurred while Mr. Champeney was in the privy, and whether the revolver fell from his pocket or struck against something that made it go off he cannot state. After the shot he screamed and yelled until two or three men could run from the office and assist him into the depot. From there he was removed to his home on Leavenworth between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, where Dr. Ralph was called in to examine and dress the wound. It was discovered that the ball, a misel of 38 caliber, had entered the rear part of his right thigh, ranged downward and through to the front part of his leg, producing not only an extremely painful but quite dangerous wound. Dr. Ralph probed several times for the ball, but could not find it. The man was resting easy last night and recovery had commenced, but he is not out of danger by any means.

A BOLD ROBBERY.

Mrs. Harding's Bedroom Entered and Pilfered by a Thief.

Yesterday morning about 3 o'clock a thief entered the residence of Mrs. S. V. Harding, No. 617 Pacific street, and got away with \$63 in money, besides considerable jewelry. It is supposed that the sounder came over from Council Bluffs with the circus, and after securing all the booty he could return to his own side of the river. He gained his entrance to the house through a back door, by first breaking out a window light near the door, thus enabling him to put his hand in and turn the lock. After getting in he found a table and several chairs sitting near the door, where Mrs. Harding's roomers had been playing casino, but he did not enter the room, as he had a clear exit. Then he invaded Mrs. Harding's sleeping apartment, and in her bureau drawer secured the \$63 and jewelry. From there he went into the room where one or two men were sleeping. They heard him and inquired who it was. Receiving no answer, one of the parties got up and began to strike a light. At that the thief ran out, crawled through a hole in the yard fence and made good his escape.

Grading Contracts.

The board of public works had a meeting at 7 o'clock Saturday evening and opened contracts for street paving work. Awards were made as follows: For paving Farnam from 15 to 16, with Sioux Falls granite, to E. J. Brennan, at \$3.09 per square yard, laid on broken stone and sand. To Brennan, for laying flag stone crossings, at \$4.50 per square yard. To the Barber Asphalt company, for paving Farnam from Eighteenth to Twentieth streets at \$2.98, the company to insure its work for five years; also to the same company, the contract for paving Cumington from Twentieth to Division at the same price. They are to put in granite gutters two feet wide at \$4.19 per square yard.
