Stocks were more active today, but the increased business was at the expense of a further decline in quotations for the most active stocks, a portion of which, however, was recovered shortly after 3 o'clock. Prices this morning were generally 1/2 to 1/4 lower than closing quotations of Friday, and considerable weakness was developed in early dealings. The Gold stocks were not active, and losses in quotations were only small. Lackwanna, stock was on the active list and shows 1/2 advance. There was considerable strength developed in final dealings in Northwesters, which arose in the last hour on June 1, and closed a shade lower with a loss of 1/4, while St. Paul is down 1 per cent. Other net losses are from 1/4 to 3/4 per cent. above the lowest figures reached in the afternoon.
