NEW YORK, June 10.—Money—Easy at 1 per cent.

Prime mercantile paper—4@5 per cent.

Foreign Exchange—Quiet; sterling bills, \$4.85; demand, \$4.86.

Governments—Strong on limited business, with sales of three at \$1035.

Stocks have not developed a single new feature of interest to day. Prices were strong with slight reactions until about 10 o'clock, when the highest quotations of the day were generally reached by the comparatively active stocks, the gains amounting to 2@1 per cent. In the next hour there was a moderate reaction, during which about one-half of the previous gains were lost. Between 2 and 3 o'clock extreme dullness was the feature, the most prominent prices remaining until the close, with fluctuations of 2@1 per cent. The closing quotations, however, indicated heaviness in most of the active stocks.

Hogs—Receipts were liberal at the Union stock yards, two-day market, 10@15 lower. Good mixed packing, \$3.80@4.05.

Hogs—Good and good to choice mixed packing, \$3.50@3.60. Common rough hogs and skips unsaleable. All sales of stock in this market are made per pound live weight unless otherwise stated. Dressed hams at 10@12 per pound for weights of 200 pounds and upwards and 10@12 for under 200 pounds. Pregnant sows are docked 40 pounds and stags 30 pounds.

General Produce

Butter—The market remains in its dull condition and prices have not changed any. The choice out of all receipts of fresh grass butter is still going at 10c, with fair qualities at 7@8c and inferior at 5@6c.

Eggs—Steady at 10c, but are a little more active, and the market is prepared for its movement before long. Canning is now necessary, and shippers would find it to their advantage to do before shipping, instead of paying freight on rotten eggs.

Poultry—Receipts of old chickens continue to be quite heavy and sales are not very brisk.

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
