In the latter position he scored a hard name and was almost looked upon as a desperado, while he was an alleged minion of the law. He was addicted to drink, and on his visits to Leadville never failed to uncurb this passion and to make things as alarming and uncomfortable as possible for those around him.

Among the most conspicaous sets in his career was that of the killing of "Dutch Bill" while making the arrest. oodness towards us.
