OUR INDIAN TROUBLES.

The condition of affairs among the Indians of the southwest is not at all satisfactory, and the prospects are that, in addition to the trouble with Geronimo and his band of Chiricahuas, the Apaches generally will break loose, that the southern Cheyennes of the Indian territory will go upon the war path, and that the Utes of southern Colorado will follow suit.

It is reported that both Blaine and Logan and possibly Senator Everts will stamp Ohio for Foraker. This will make a lively campaign. The main fight will be to elect a republican legislature.

OTHER LANDS THAN OURS. The Tory ministry has at last been organized and entered upon its duties under Lord Salisbury. In accepting the responsibility the new premier has been constrained to procure a promise of forbearance from Mr. Gladstone which enables him to take office with some degree of safety.

It is almost incredible, but nevertheless true, that Howard county, in this state, has voted bonds to aid in the extension of a Union Pacific branch. In these days when bonded subsidies are regarded everywhere as no better than an imposition and dead give-away it is surprising that any railroad should either ask or secure bonds to aid in constructing branches which are needed as feeders to its main line.

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THE future of Anglo-Russian relations is by no means so clear. That Russia regards the accession of the Salisbury cabinet as a distinct threat, she has already manifested sufficiently manifest. Whether that prospect will render her more timorous or more aggressive remains to be seen.
