Pregnant sows are docked 40 pounds and stage 80 pounds.

Butter—Buyers are very particular and picking close, only the best grades of fresh grass butter—well worked, sweet and even in color—are taken upon arrival at not to exceed 10¢ while mixed qualities are dragging with price ranging from 8¢ down to 4¢. Some of the better brands are well worked, fresh, not worked properly and sour quickly. Particular points should be taken at this time in putting up butter, and packages should be well cleaned and soaked before use. Fresh grass butter is still going on, with fair quality at 78¢@ and inferior at 75¢@.

Eggs—In moderate supply and rather steady at 10¢. Candlings is about necessary, and shippers would find it to their advantage to do it before shipping instead of paying freight on return eggs.

Poultry—Old chickens are in better demand and prices of the better brands are high, fresh, not worked properly and sour quickly. Particular points should be taken at this time in putting up butter, and packages should be well cleaned and soaked before use. Fresh grass butter is still going on, with fair quality at 78¢@ and inferior at 75¢@.
