T.) special says: The fact that United States troops have been and are being used to herd Chinese alayes was demonstrated beyond the shadow of doubt here to-day. The Chinese testified that they were kiddapped and that they were put aboard the cara at Evanaton, and told that they would be taken to California. The engine of their train was attached to its western end to aid in the deception, but after the heathens had been crowded into freight cars the engine was quickly trans-ferred to the eastern end, and before the Chinamen knew what had been done the train was en route to Rock Springs. 
