The Obscoulty of His Letters Lead to His Deserved Arrests

POINTS ABOUT THE CITY PARK

A Serious Accident The Attempt to Rid the City of Hard Cases-Other News Gleanings about the City.

Cleaning Out the Gauge.

The recent rounding up of the police, which a large number of vags, tinhorn gamblers and dirty prostitutes were gathered in, does not seem to be resulting in much. Nearly all those who were thus arrested have been discharged or let out on bonds, with little probability of ever being tried, while a few have been given a chance to go out of the city. Such have promised to avail themselves of the chance, but as in times past they will not probably remain away long. But few have been fined, and fewer yet have been compelled to pay their fines.

One instance is sufficient to illustrate the disappointment of the police, who went to the trouble of making a raid. Hattie Anderson, whose husband lives in Omaha, has placed her children in a charmable institution, and has become a denized of "rotten row." When the po-lice raided her house they found the no-torious "Sandy" Knight, who used to be an Omaha Policeman, a young girl, and this woman. All were in for the night, but the officers could not swear positively that the Anderson woman and Knight were together, the coming of the police having caused the innertes to jump up. Despite the belief, which could not but Despite the belief, which could not but be strong, there was a little technical de-fect in the proof, and the woman went free. "Sandy," who has a wife in Oma-ha, was given time to get out of the city, but there is no assurance that he will stay

away. The young girl found in the house was also discharged.

Another place raided was the house kept by the colored family over which Minnto Johnson lives, located also on Pierce street. There were there Johnson and his wife, a colored girl hid under the bed, a white woman, and three white men. The men and the white woman have the reputation of being of the low-est order, but the difficulty of getting just the proof required caused a general release on technical grounds.

It seems impossible for these disreputake ma impossible for these disrepti-table places to be cleaned out. That part of Pierce street known as "Rotten Row" is rightly named. It a dis-grace to the city. It should be cleaned up, but there is little encouragement for the pelice to make arrests if those who make this section so disreputable are to be turned losse. be turned loose.

Obscene Love Letters.

Jo Bilbo, a farmer, living about a mile out of Creston, is now in trouble of a peculiar nature. A warrant was yesterday issued for his arrest on the charge of sending obscene literature through the mails. The warrant has been placed in the hands of a deputy United States marshal, who is expected to arrive with his prisoner to-day for a hearing before the commissioner. The facts as stated by the complaint are that Jo some time ago fell desperately in love with a young woman named Lizzie Kirkpatrick, who has the reputation of being a hard working, honest girl. She rather favored his attentions for a time, but soon changed her manner toward him and desired to have nothing more to do with him. The disappointment of not winning her seems to have angered Jo greatly. He commenced writing letters to her, urging her to change her manner toward him, but as she refused to accept any of his proffered attentions, his letters changed in tone, growing at first sarcastic and bitter, then obscene and low. He wrots a great many such epistles, there being about forty which she claims to be able to produce in evidence against him. He charges her in these letters with having no desire for an honest, true hosband, and taents her with preferring railway men who spand with preferring railway men who spend their money on women of low repute. Not satisfied with writing such dirty let-ters, it is said that he has written numerous postal cards directed to her, and left them lying about where they would attract public attention. On these cards he confined himself to insinu-ations about her reputation. Anonymous letters have also been scattered about Creston, and several have been sent her, some of which were most vile. She thinks he is the author of these, and so tortured has she been that the only relief seemed his arrest and punishment Many of the letters produced in substan-

Many of the letters produced in substantiation of her charge are of the lowest order, untit for any one to read, much less to be published. It is thought that he hoped by such constant annoyance to force her into marrying him, but this strange method of his wooing has not proved successful.
