

THE SUPREME COURT.

Decisions Rendered by Nebraska's High Body on November 24. Chaplin V. Lee. Stror from Colfax county Affirmed. Opinion by Maxwell, J.

1-In an action for slander on a charge neer of a school district, where the testi-mony is conflicting as to the funds in the tands of the treasurer, it is not error to refuse to give an instruction, that if the trensurer has "refused to pay any draft, order or warrant drawn upon him by the proper officer or officers, this would con-

inute embezzlement
2—To constitute embezzlement it is esential that the owner should be deprived of the property alleged to be embezzled by an adverse use or holding. Buldwin vs. Bood. Appeal from Lancaster county. Affirmed. Opinion by Max-

same way. State vs. County Board Saline County. Mandamus. Writ awarded. Opinion by Reese, 1-In counties under township organization, the board of sapervisors have authority to hear and determine complaints against county officers under the provisions of article 2, chapter 18, of the compiled statutes, 1885.

2-Where the board has assumed juris diction of such a cause, and has passed upon the sufficiency of the complaint and afterwards refused to act in the case, and upon an application to the supreme court in the exercise of its original jurisdiction for a mandamus to compel ac-tion, the court will not inquire into the sufficiency of the complaint further than to ascertain if it is such a complaint. To that extent the complaint was examined and held sufficient.

3-Waile the supreme court can by a mandamus compel a board of county supervisors to act upon a complaint against a county officer, yet it can in no way control its judgment or legal discre-

4-A respondent, in a proceeding to remove him from a county office, has the right to present as many legal questions for decision by the county board as he may think necessary for his proper de-fense, but the board has the authority and right to decide such questions either or without argument as it may deem proper. It is not required to waste time in listening to unnecessary argu-

5-Where a party to a preceeding be-fore the county board causes the attend-ance of unnecessary witnesses, or in any other manner needlessly augments costs and expenses of a trial, it is within the power of the board to tax such unnecessary costs to the party making them and it should in all proper cases

6-In a proceeding before a board of supervisors, to remove from office a county offi er, two-thirds of all the members electe constitute a quorum. It is not essential that all the members be present. But of a special meeting all most be positive and the positive

must be notified, 7-When a complaint against a county officer is made and filed with the county clerk, it is the duty of the county board to hear it. They have no authority to order its removal to the district court for

Kansas Cowboy: Some of our ranch-men are embarking in the business of raising buffalo. There are about fifty head upon the ranch of the Franklin Land and Cattle company, and there are also some buffaloes on the Goodnight ranch. C. J. Jones, of Garden City, also has some. The Franklin company is paying \$50 a head for buffaloe calves. There is a herd of 4,000 buffaloes in the western portion of the Neutral strip. When buffalo robes are worth \$15 to \$20 apiece, and buffalo steak 121 cents a pound in the Dodge City market, it would seem as if there was money in buffalo raising. A dozen years ago, millious of buffaloes roamed at will over these prairies and they were slaughtered for fun and for their robes. It would not be surprising if they would yet be more valuable than beef cattle.

A Tallow Tree.

Rochester Chronicle: This remarkable tree is a native of China. In the island of Chusen quantities of oil and tallow are extracted from its fruit, which is gathered when the tree has lost its leaves. The twigs bearing the fruit are cut down and carried to a farmhouse, where the seed is stripped off and put into a wood-en cylindrical box open at one end and pierced with holes at the opposite end. The box is then suspended in a cylindrical kettle containing water, and the diameter of which differs but little from that of the box. The water is then made to boil, and the steam, penetrating into the box, softens the seeds and facilitates the separation of the tallow. After about a quarter of an hour's exposure to steam the seeds are poured into a steam mortar, where they are stirred about until all the tallow has been separated into a semi-liquid state. It is afterward poured into a cylinder with as ole at the bottom through which it is driven by the action of a press. It comes out perfectly white, free from all impurities and soon
