ASSAULTED HUGHES QUITE LOW.

A Forged Order for Clothing-Matrimonial Misfits-Other News Gleanings In and About the Bluffs.

What the Bluffs Officers Say. The sensational talk aroused in Omaha

over the Travis case has caused some revival of the talk which the case at the time enused in Conneil Bluffs. Travis was wanted here for raising a check of Spetman & Bro. on the First National bank. Chief Skinner went to Omaha and found Travis, but the latter tried to commit suicide rather than "go to the pen," as he stated at the time. He was badly wounded, and was left in Omaha, the officers not deening it best to move him. The fact that he was released caused much indignation here at the time and efforts were made to determine who was at fault. Now that the matter has been brought up in another phase among the Omaha officers, inquiry among the Council Bluffs officers corroborates the statements made by the BEE at that Travis was not brought over here was that his condition did not warrant moving him. It is true, as Marshal Cummings states, that the officers here sent him no word. They say they were waiting for some word from him, as they understood the Omaha officers would give notice when Travis was able to travel. They claim that instead of being telephoned several times to come after Travis, but one telephone message was received. That was about 11 o'clock, four days after the arrest. The city marshal received this message to the effect that the Conneil Blufts officers must come after Travis or he would be turned loose. The warrant by this time was in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Clatterbuck, and by the time the marshal had notified the chief of police and the chief had told Clatterbuck it was in the middle of the afternoon. He went to Omaha at once on getting the word, but Travis had been set free. The parties here familiar with the matter at the time were quite indignant about it, feeling that there had been bungling work, and that some one had been grossly to blame. There was talk on the part of the bank officials of taking some definite action to fix the responsi-bility of Travis' escape on the right par-ties but the affair blew over. The officers here claim that they were not to blame, but that the Omaha officers were the ones. Those who are knowing to the details, however, do not take any stock in the talk about bribery, but seem to think

the Sioux City & Pacific railway company has brought in a verdict giving the plaintiff \$9,500. This is the largest verdict given here in a damage case in many years. Knapp was an engineer on that road, and met with an accident, which he claims was caused by the ties being rotten, the rails spreading and letting part of the train off the rails. Warrants or Cash.

The saloon licenses for December come in slowly. About twenty delinquents are holding off, most of them belonging to the saloon men's association. The new arrangement, by which after the 10th of each month delinquents must pay \$50, either in eash or city warrants, has not gone into effect, so there is no special penalty incurred in delay. In fact there seems to be some advantage under the present muddled controversy between the court and council. The judge holds that while he cannot take anything but eash for fines or beenses, yet for security for appearance he can take any satisfac-tory bonds or guarantee. When a saloon man is brought before him on the charge of neglecting to take out a license, he claims that if the man chooses to put up city warrants as security for his appearance for trial, he can accept them, and if the man fails to appear, this security is forfeited. In this way the saloon men have sought to pay their licenses in war-rants. Perhaps this is what they are waiting for. If they pay their license, they must pay eash. If arrested, they get a continuance, put up warrants for their appearance, and these are forteited. That ends the matter.
