



ABOUT HIDES AND SKINS. Texas, South American and Northwestern Hides, Tanuing and Dressing-Some Inter-

esting Secrets of the Trade.

Standing on one of the Martin docks a Brooklyn Union reporter watched with some interest the discharging of a steam-ship of its cargo. It was roaded with hides, collee, and other South American products. The hides were from Morte-video and the coffee from the upper La Plata. There were 25,000 hides, a com-paratively small invoice, taken from the Plata. There were 25,000 hides, a com-paratively small invoice, taken from the hold of the ship (the "Holes") and plied on the dock. These were subsequently inspected. It was interesting to watch their handler. Without opening the hides he could, as if by look and touch, tell the sound from the defective ones—those that had been spoiled by meven drying in the sun, those that had been attacked by worms, and those which nits had eaten worms, and those which hits had eaten into and damaged. Formerly New York was the great hide importing center of this country. Here not only the dried hides of Texas and Mexico, Central and South America were Mexico, Central and South America were brought, but the green or salted ones of the northwestern plains. This important trade is gradually changing its market. It is moving toward Boston. There the de-mand for leather is heavier than it is in New York and Brooklyn, the great tan-neries and shoe factories of the United States being in New England—mainly in Massachusetts. Still the trade in this vi-cialty is enormous. It is increasing here, but not in the ratio to population which marks its growth in the neighborhood of marks its growth in the neighborhood of

Boston. Boston Brooklyn may be regarded as the en-trepot of the metropolis for foreign hides. Removed from the ship they are stored n one of the great warehouses. they are taken to New York or shipped they are taken to New Fork or shipped direct to tanneries in the interior, where they are speedily transformed into leadher of various degrees of fineness and of weight. The hides from Buenos Ayres, though small-er, are said to be of a much higher grade of fiber them these schuch higher grade of fiber than those which come from Texas. Texans are plumper. The skin taken from the young bovine born in Buenos Ayres makes the finest French tanned calfskins, and for this reason, it being susceptible of a higher linish, is in greater demand for the better kinds of uppers for men's and women's boots, gaiters and shoes. 





The Gold street man added that it was not an unusual thing to raise a whole sun-dried hide, intended for use in very heavy work, from twenty eight to thirty pounds above the average weight.

Green hides are the reverse of this. It takes two pounds of raw or salted hide to make one pound of dry leather, suitable for soles of boots and brogans. It is in the dressing, now done by steam and by chemical methods, that the largest number of secrets are supposed to be held. Coloring and finishing calfskins in an extra superior style is an art few are permitted to master. The currier who can make the most marketable hide

is held in the highest esteem as a workmen. "It is somewhat curious," the reporter's informant ad-ded, "to inspect the work of different finishers. If two skins, exactly alike in fiber and age and general quality, were handed to two different curriers, one would, in all probability, show a smooth satin-like surface, while the other would be, compared to it, quite rough to the touch and coarse to the eye. The finer inished goods would, of course, be the more marketable. The one, however, would be quite as durable as the other." In classifying skins great care is taken. It costs as much in time and money to tan a tainted as it does a perfect hide and for such allowance must be made. Tainted or wormeaten skins make an inferior leather. The cost rer pound, whether of upper or sole leather, is much lower in the nurket. These classes of tanned skins are made up into inferior goods—into auction boots and shoes,

and into trunks, satchels, chair seats, The cuticle of every living creature can be converted into leather. Even

the epidermis of man may be made available when prop-erly treated. There is a tradition that Genghis Khan or some other of the great war chiefs of the Tartar people, before dying ordered that the skin should be removed from his body, and when cured be stretched upon the beads of a drum-this drum to be beaten when his followers were about to charge an enemy. It is added that the dead warrior's "hide" thus used won more victories for his sols diers than when he led them in person. The turning of the skins of quadrupeds into leather, and its after uses, would, if exhaustively treated, make a valuable work for those who have a turn for statistics in connection with the increase of wealth and the industrial arts. The leather trade is enormous in its results. If it were stricken from the official re-




