An increase in the amount of wheat and flour on passage to the United Kingdom and the contineat of about 1,000,000 bushels, had a depressing effect on the market, but as the most of this increase is directly attributable to the increased export movement from America. this trifying feature of the situation lost much of its force.

MINOR GRAINS-Corn and oats gave signs of life again to-day. The activity in oats was something astonishing, and the price bobbed about within a life range, with an appearance of pervous energy that was as refreshing as it was unusual. Corn and outs were strong, and the inquiry for cash proper-

ty was noticeably brisk.
