CEDAR COUNTY'S COAL FIND. A Bonanza for the People-The Need

of a Railroad.

ST. HELENA, Cedar Co., Feb. 10 .- [Cor respondence of the BEE. |-The principal topic of discussion in this county is railroads and coal mines. The people of the northern part of the county have been fortunate in the discovery of good coal at a depth of from forty to four hundred and sixty-five feet, but the thickness of the vein is not ascertained, as the cold weather put a stop to the work but it is supposed that the vein that was struck four hundred and fifty feet down is from four to seven feet in thickness. The company is making preparations to forward the work of prospecting as early as the weather will permit. The coal vein mentioned above was discovered about one-half mile from the Missouri river, and two miles east of St. Helena. If this coal find proves as good as anticipated, Cedar county will experience the biggest boom ever witnessed in any other county in Nebraska. St. Helena is situated on the bank of

the Missouri river nearly opposite the mouth of James river in Dakota territory, is a rich and fertile agricultura country, with plenty of good timber, both below and above town. The nearest railroad point in this county is over fifteen miles and the nearest railroad station is seven miles due north from St. Helena.

Yankton, a thriving city of several thousand inhabitants, is situated on the Missouri river ten miles northwest of St. Helena. A railroad running from the southern part of this state via Omaha to the southeastern boundary of Cedar county on the Logan valley, thence in a southwesterly direction down the east Bow valley to St. James, thence along the river bottom to St. Helena and to Yankton, would pass through the best part of the county and furnish transportotion to the largest number of the farmers and stock growers of this county who now market their large surplus of products in other parts, mostly in Yank-ton and Gayvill, Dakota territory. The country along the river demands a railroad and it is bound to come sooner or CODGER.

The Apaches.

Chicago Herald: "I think," said a prominent officer at army headquarters, "that the Apaches who suryesterday, rendered the other day in Chihuahua will not be allowed to return to Arizona. The whole batch, Geronimo included, are likely to be bundled into a train and carted off to the Dry Tortugas. It would be very unwise to let them go back to the San Carlos reservation. Geronimo could not be depended on to keep the peace, and in a few months the army would again be chasing him and his braves across the Mexican border. Geronimo is, by the way, a very superior Indian. He is a Mexican Apache, and as a boy was a military pupil, so to speak, of Old Cochise, the greatest chief the Apaches ever had. Geronimo speaks Spanish as well as his own language, and is a man of a good deal of ability. Now that Crook has him in his corral, he ought never to let go of him. And the only way to insure peace in Arizona is to ship the whole of Geronimo's band to the Dry Tortugas, or anywhere far away from the old haunts. Most of the Apaches are now inclined to peace. It is only Geron-imo's and Nana's old bands that are hospractically subdued or scattered. If the Napa is dead and his warriors are leading men out of the country it will in sure peace in that region. Crook has had to suffer a good deal of censure be-cause of his alleged mismanagement down there, but it is not his fault that the Indians are constantly being sent back to their reservation, and as constantly breaking out again. Now is the time to

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

Wheat appears to be in the position of a

young bird which has fallen out of the nest to the ground. It can go down no further, nor can it rise without parental aid; at least not until its wings grow. All it can do is to flutter around a little bit and make the looker-on think that maybe it isn't in quite as bad a fix as it is. The market appears to be on a hard bottom, but on the other hand it evinces no ability to get away from it by advancing. If there are any budding wings in sight the trade generally cannot see them with the naked eye. The stagnation is complete, and the longer it endures the less outside business is received. Something must be done, and I look for the brokers to stimulate activity very soon even if the reality is wanting. They can't very well afford to sit here and starve because the country is out of the market. Ye little fishes! If Thursday was dull, and if Friday was duller, to-day was dullest, Talk about silence "brooding o'er a still and pulseless world." You should have seen her do the brooding act o'er the still and pulse. less market to-day. It was up the center and back to your places all day. Three-eighths of le was the limit of fluctuation. Puts and calls sold last night at 84%c and 85%@ 85%c, and neither one of them was even touched all day. The market opened at 85@85 ge for May, and that was the center of gravity. In these more violent moments prices got 3-16c away from this point. And the close. Anybody could have called the turn on the close. It was "biff" in the same hole. Bang in the eye of Mr. Eighty-five. You know our old friend Eighty-five. He has been on hand every night since Wednesday, and has grabbed May to his breast with the fervid embrace of a bridegroom, I hope they are married, as they seem to be. It would silence scandal. Ream and Lester were both buyers again, and one or the other of them took in most of the larger offerings. The sellers were principally among the scalpers, who were long and didn't want to stand over till Monday on either side. The big shorts are standing pat, but the undertone of the market is beginning to make some of them nervous. A general hard freeze about this time throughout the wheat belt would run most of them to cover. Perhaps all except Jack Cudahy. He says he don't care how high wheat goes, he will keep out his line of shorts all the time and keep making the average 20c a year carrying charges on it. If it goes up like a rocket some day it will come down like a stick some other day, he says, and all that time the bull s are gnawing a file. But every one Isn't Cudahy, and the short interest is supposed to be so large that a good sized crop scare would make the bears climb over each other to get out. There wasn't any export. There wasn't any increase of receipts. No war. No London riot. No nothing. Puts and calls sold within 1/2 of the market. The visible supply, it is guessed, will show 750,000 decrease. Monday's estimated receipts are 55 cars.

CORN-Corn moved up a little in the Febrnary, March and April deliveries, but May closed unchanged. There seemed to be some good buying by brokers, and the offerings were all absorbed by a very few persons. A cold snap, which would check receipts, might very easily give a little boom to corn, which is regarded by the trade generally as chear enough at present quotations. mated receipts for Monday are 335 cars.

Provisions-The provision list sagged was 15c lower than the top for May pork and somewhat weaker for both ribs and lard. "Old Hutch" was in the ring as a bear on the former and pounded it all day. There was no strong buying observed, and he had things pretty much his own way. The trade looks for a bulge next week, especially in ribs, which are very strong; but light receipts of hogs may have very little effect on the market, which is supposed now to be entirely under the manipulation and the control of a few heavy packers. The estimates vary, but the best are that the week's income will be about 100,000.
