FARMERS AWAKENING. An Alliance Formed for Active Work

in Seward County. B PRECINCY, Seward County, Neb. Feb. 27.-[Correspondence of the BEE.]-Word was given out on Monday last that on Wednesday night, February 24, a meeting would be held in Center school house (the voting place in B precinct) to arrange a Farmer's union. A constitution was adopted and an organization effected as follows:

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Farmer's Protective union of the republican and democratic parties of the republican and democratic parties in Nebraska, and no change of political or party names shall be required to at-tain membership.

Sec. 2. Its officers shall consist of a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer; also, an executive committee

of seven and a finance committee of three members, all to be chosen by the presi-

ARTICLE II. Sec. 1. The great aim and ambition of the Farmers' union shall be to limit and equalize railroad transportation and pasequalize railroad transportation and pas-senger rates in Nebraska to an average with the Erie, New York Central, Penn-sylvania and Baltimore & Onio roads, and with a view to this end we hereby agree and pledge ourselves to vote for no state officials except they stand squarely on the above platform. on the above platform.

ARTICLE III.

Sec. 1. An assessment not to exceed —— per month may be levied upon the members of this union for the purpose of defraying regular and special expenses, and may be made at any regular meet-ing by a vote of two-thirds of the mem-bers present.

ARTICLE IV. Sec. 1. This constitution may amended at any regular meeting, a proposition to that effect having been submitted at the previous meeting, by a vote of two thirds of the members present. Sec. 2. All qualified members shall be admitted to membership by signing this

constitution. constitution.
Sec. 3. The regular meetings of the Farmers' union shall be once each month, and special meetings may be held upon the call of the president and secretary.
Sec. 4. By-laws may be made not condicting with this constitution.

Sec. 4. By-laws may be made not conflicting with this constitution.

The officers chosen were Calvin J.
Wright, president; T. J. Drake, vice president; Herbert Fender, secretary, and J.
R. Rinehart, treasurer. Speeches were made by T. N. McCane, James Brinkerhoff and others against high and protective tariffs, excessive railroad rates, and in favor of the continuance of silver coingre with an increase of currency to at age with an increase of currency to at least \$25 per capita, and in favor of re-turning Senator Van Wyck to the United States senate. Resolutions were passed embodying the above ideas, and to stand firm for farmers' rights of party affilia-tions, with the view of abolishing syndi-cate favoritism and ultimating in laws beneficial to the common classes, and that all farmers and laborers in Nebraska are invited to co-operate in this undertaking with the hope that in the near by and by we can prevent so much legalized stealing.
