#### BEARS POUND WHEAT AGAIN

In Spite of Heavy Buying Orders the Market Turns Downward.

NERVOUS CONDITION ALL DAY

A Desperate Attempt to Pull the Price For May Down to 80c Fails-Provisions Firmer -General Reports.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

CHICAGO, March 22,- [Special Telegram.]-WHEAT-Wheat for May delivery opened at 82c, a decline from Saturday of 14c. Cudthy and other professionals immediately began selling. The tremendous offerings broke the price to 80% for May, 82% o for June, and 82%c, for August. The element in the bean favor was the selling of a large amount of long wheat held by timid parties who had become thoroughly frightened at the prospects of a stamp. It was well known in the crowd that a large number of holders had positively refused to margin below 80c, which they had led themselves to think, was a perfectly safe limit. With that boundary in reachng distance they lost hope and concluded not to follow the market any further. The miders made a desperate attempt to break the market to 80c, but it received, unexpectedly, strong support at and about 81c for May, from Hutchinson, Hamill and Brim, Orr, Crittenden & Comes, Milmine & Bodman, and Fleming & Boyden and other strong commission houses, who seemed to have unlimited orders to buy on the break. The market accordingly buoyed up, and although the tone of it continued bearish, quotations showed that the terrifying influence of bear raiding had ceased to be the ruling factor for the time being. The market was in a nervous state all morning, however, and as flightty as a colt. Cables were easy. The grain markets without exseption were depressed. The visible supply estimates were small. The feeling here and at interior points was not one of boisterous confidence in the future, and the undertone of strength that manifested itself occasionally seemed to be of an elastic rather than the unyielding kind. Altogether was a bear day, and after the temporary recovery caused by the heavy buy-

ing above noted, the market again became soft and the bears went at it again, hammering the price down to 80%c, where it closed weakly at 1 o'clock, a loss as compared with Saturday at the same hour of 1%c. The report that the northwestern millers had put down their buying prices was freely circulated, and news of a spreading of the railway strike in the southwest had a dispiriting effect. Very generally favorable crop news had an additional limbering effect. Corn-Corn shared to a limited extent in

the excitement that pervaded wheat, but fluctuations were within a range of %c, and the general temper of the market was strong The decline in May to 38%c has checked receipts at primary points, and the difference of 336c between cash and May has tempted a great many country holders to carry their own property for the profits, taking the precaution to insure shekels by selling against their holdings. This latter fact is not noted as an ele ment of strength, but as an item which may account for the falling off in receipts quite as much as the recent decline in prices. The noon closing for May was 38%c, which was substantially the same as on Saturday. OATS-Oats sold down fractionally, but re-

covered, and at 1 o'clock closed at opening quotations and seemingly quite firm. Provisions-Provisions were rather firmer to-day, and there was a substantial buying of oork at low and ribs at higher prices than on Saturday. May pork sold at \$9.80 to \$9.90, but receded, and closed at \$9,773, June be ing quoted at \$9.82, an advance for the day of 5c. Lard, at the end of the long session, was 21/@5c higher than Saturday .

ANOTHER ACCOUNT. CHICAGO, March 22 .- The wheat pit on change this morning contained more excited operators than it has for months, due to the break of 15c inside of half an hour. The situation for a few minutes was extremely panicky, for there was no telling where the break would stop. The drop from 82c to 81%c was very sharp, and nundreds of thousand of bushels of wheat were sold. Large quantitles of country wheat were sold on stop tities of country wheat were sold on stop orders. The limit on some was 81c, but that price could not be got for it. There was also a suspicion that some big lines of long wheat held by northwest interests were being sold by Ream, Jones, McCornick and other houses. From 80% the price slowly recovered to 81%c. Fork, mess, became stronger and advanced to 89.90 for May. There seems to have been no particular reason for the decline in wheat except a great liquidation on the part of the longs. There was no great excitement and no failures. Trading was very dull.
