BASEMENT SCHOOLS SYSTEM

Views of the Members on This Subject-City Treasurer Buck's Report-The New Teachers-No More Recess.

Omaha's Educational Board. The board of education met last even ing, those present being Messrs. Points, president; Conoyer, secretary; Copeland. Clark, Gibbons, Coburn and Long. There were but few spectators present. The meeting was one in every way in the interests of the city, many resolutions beneficial to the health and well-being of scholars being introduced and passed. The city treasurer's report was gratifying in the extreme, showing that the amount of money now on hand is much more than could be expected in so short a time-some four and one-half years. The basement question was brought up. and treated in the best manner possible, considering the funds now on band, and buildings in view. The building of an addition to the high school, and many other matters of interest came up, all of which are given in the following report of the meeting:

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS. City Treasurer Buck's monthly report was read and ordered placed on file. Reports of the examining committee were read and placed on file.

A communication was read and adopted, saying that the work on the school house at the corner of Eighteenth and Casteller streets is finished, and the balance due should be paid the contrac-

A report fron, the committee on certificates saying that certificates had been issued to Martha A.Cook, Emma L. Newcomb, Ella Gordon, Hattie S. Pratt, Jennie Roberts, Fannie E. Fernald, Lottie F. Mitchell, Olive Hubbard, P. Irene Fort and Lizzie Cole.

John Rush tendered his resignation as a member of the board of examiners. The resignation was accepted, and the board tendered him their thanks for the efficiency of his psat labors.

Mrs. Minnie Eyler tendered her resig-

nation as teacher on account of ill health. It was accepted. John Niles asked that he be given the

vacant position of junitor. Referred to committee on building and property, and all other applications for the same position to be referred to the above committee without being read, giving them power to act.
To the Board of Education—Gentlemen:

I enclose a detailed list of all the bonds in my hands belonging to the school sinking fund and amounting to \$64,000. Bonds of the school district amounting to \$100,000 will become due July 1, 1886, and in order to meet their payment it will be necessary, some time before that date, to convert into cash most of the bonds owned by the Sinking fund.
You will observe that bonds amounting to

\$6,000 will become due July 1. These it will not be necessary to sell. Also bonds amount-ing to \$5,000 will become due August 1, and

it will not be necessary to sell them as 1 can carry them as cash for one month.

Eleven bonds of \$500 each (\$5,500) last described on the list are the least desirable for sale, although just as good an investment as any for the short time they have to run, and as I think we can redeem the \$100,000 without selling these bonds I would recommend that they be kept. The remaining bonds \$47,500, those first dewith these sold I think the \$100,000 of bonds can be redeemed July 1.

The balance in sinking fund now is about

As some of the bonds for sale should bring quite a premium I think the total will be but little short of \$100,000. I bring this matter to your attention, so early, in order that there may be ample time to consider what should be done and also to do it before July and be ready to meet the payment promptly. Mr. Clark thought differently. "We did not," said he, "have time to talk to Mr. Copeland this afternoon, as he was not present at our meeting here."
"Didn't know you had one," said Mr.
Copeland, "If I had you would have seen

me nere. We haven't any money to build with, and are counting our chickens before they are hatched. I think it very desirable, but to erect a building before having received an appropriation for the purpose is foolish."
Mr. Gibbon thought that the old building could be enlarged, and Mr. Copeland

stood in" with him.

Mr. Long was in favor of the new building, "thereby." he said, "getting the boilers removed from the old building into a new and safe one where they would not explode, and where there would be no danger."
Mr. Conoyer said that the building

could not be erected for less than \$45,000 or \$50,000, while an addition of six to eight rooms can be made for something like \$25,000. Mr. Colburn moved that the matter be recommitted to the committee to be re-

Mr. Conoyer moved as an amendment that the Leavenworth street school be included in the resolution. This amendment was passed on the spur of the moment, but was reconsidered, put to a second vote, and lost, after which the original motion was passed.

This resolution called Superintendent James to his feet again. He said that much complaint had been made by outsiders on the basement school system, but that

they were the only ones. He considered the basements better than any buildings that could be procured at the present time. "I can say, gentlemen," continued Mr. James, "that the floors of those basements are as dry and warm as is the one on which which we now are. There is absolutely no dampness or other disagreeable feature of that sort." Mr. Livesey said that the teachers and

scholars would rather be in basements than buildings. "It is all a dream. The whole town has been dreaming for some time: this idea that there are creeping animals, dampness, sickness, etc., in these rooms is a dream." He thought the basements as good as anywhere else. Mr. Clark was not in favor of the resolution. He did not see why Mr. Conoyer had presented it unless to curry favor with the newspapers. "I, for one, am opposed to the resolution, at least until we get new buildings."

Mr. Long said that the room occupied by one of the schools was an old Methodby one of the schools was an old McHodist church, not as good as the basement. "Something must be done, surely, for the children in order to give them a place to attend school. At the south school, to-day, so many children came in that nail kegs had to be brought in for them to sit on "Yes," Mr. Conover remarked, "in the south school water flows quite readily. I

saw this myself." An amendment to the resolution was adopted, authorizing the above committee to secure a building for the Pacific

school That the secretary be authorized to advertise for bids for plans and specifica-tions for a new building to be built on Woolworth street and Georgia avenue. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the bids for the Lake school be referred to the committee on buildings and property, with power to act. Carried. It was moved and seconded that the bid of the Hess Manufacturing company for three furnaces in the Lincoln school buildings be accepted. Carried. The board then adjourned.

## WHEAT ON THE DANGER LINE

The Uncertainty of the Market Causes Chicago Dealers to Fight Shy.

A STRONG REVIVAL IN CORN.

Which Breaks Somewhat in the Afternoon-Provisions Close Firm -A Peculiar Cattle Market -General Reports.

## CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

CRICAGO, April 5,- | Special Telegram. |-WHEAT-Wheat opened this morning 340 lower than it closed Saturday, and the local crowd of room traders began selling the market down from the jump. May fell to 7916e and June to Slide, a sheer descent from Sat-urday of like. Only one or two small lots were bought at 79%c. but quite a quantity changed bands at 791/6779%c. The market became stronger, though the temper of the majority of operators in the pit continued bearish. Purchasing was of a character to justify the belief that some very large lines of short wheat were covered, and brokers, who usually represent Cudahy, were uncommonly active, first in breaking the market, and then in buying. On the other hand offerings from certain quarters were exceedingly free, and the suspicion grew that, though Cudahy might be "evening up," other traders, of almost as heavy calibre, were feeling the crowd for a turn on the short side. The official report of the clearances from New York amounted to nearly 2,000,000 bushels and cables were rather better in tone, but the auxilliary domestic markets were lacking in snap and vigor. They seemed to hang with even more helplessness about the neck of Chicago than usual. Outside orders were small, but rather larger than on any day last week. The feeling that wheat is on the danger line prevents a great many of the chronic bears from selling, and bulls, who have been caught so often, are slow to take hold until they see a decided drift their way. May sold up to 7936c, and the market seemed in a very good shape when the news came of the suspension of the Duluth branch of the Milwaukee house of Hooker, Crittenden & Co., and prices dropped %c, May touching the lowest price of the day-79%c. Considerable uneasiness was felt as to the extent of the failure, but when it was learned that the Milwaukee house was not involved in the disaster, the bulls breathed easier and the market firmed up, closing at 70%@70%c for May. MINOR GRAINS-There was big trading in

corn, but the fluctuations were not wide. Patridge, Orr, Crittenden & Comes, Fraley and several other houses, supposed to have been short a great quantity of property, bought largely, and yet the market declined in the face of their purchases, closing weak at I o'clock, %c lower than Saturday. Speculation in corn is experiencing a revival apparently. Oats suffered a decline of le for eash and 3/e for May to-day, and considerable excitement prevailed in the oats crowd. PROVISIONS-Provisions exhibited a decidedly hardening tendency and the closing at 1 o'clock was at the best price of the morning session, the market showing up in strong contrast to wheat. Prices fluctuated

in an uncertain fashion until well along in the day, when a quiet buying of all the product of pork, lard and ribs started the shorts to cover and they became free buyers. AFTERNOON BOARD-Grain on the day was not large, but the market seemed to have suddenly assumed a firmer tone from some cause not apparent on the surface. was quiet and steady on the afternoon board, and closed without an appreciable change from the prices ruling at 1 o'clock.
