#### THE MARKETS VERY UNEASY.

The Strike Situation Governs Prices on Chicago Board of Trade.

EVERYBODY WANTS TO SELL

Wheat Drops Under Prophecies of Direct Evil-The Cattle Market Dull and Lower With Liberal Offerings.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET. CHICAGO, April 23,-[Special Telegram.]

WHEAT-Wheat, was active and lower, and the entire speculative market sympathized to a greater or less extent. The crowd was large, and as a good many of the scalping element were anxious to close up their trades a large quantity of grain came out for which there was fewer buyers than expected. Dis quieting strike news at home and in New York had a decided weakening effect on the tone of the general market. The burning of Andrews furniture factory and other acts of violence were quoted as likely to drive capital into retirement, paralize business and cause wide-spread depression and distress, compared with which the hard times of the past two or three years would seem a period of boundless prosperity. The preachers of evil times and cheaper prices found audiences, and a sense of timidity stole over investers. The disposition to trade off wheat for cash became more pronounced and the weakness in the market more apparent. Wheat opened 1/40% under the last quotations yesterday, and for the first half hour or such a matter the tone of the market was strong and prices advanced %c. Cables were firm and an ad vance in spring wheat of 3/66s was reported Ann offset consols were higher, and news from the winter wheat fields was confirmafory of previous reports of fine prospects of a bounteons crop. The conditions were such as to inspire in speculative holders a desire to rake in their profits, and the market could not absorb the offerings and stand up under the load. The decline did not stop till May wheat reached 80c and June 8154c, drop from the best figures of the morning of Mc. The downward movement was not characterized by excitement, values selling easily and with becoming debiberation. For the last hour the market was sluggish and was left entirely to the manipulation of scalpers. It hardened slightly, and the close at 1 o'clock was 1/@1/c above low water

mark. Conn-Corn was 1/2 lower, and the market was characterized by dullness. The trade is waiting to see how readily property that is moving eastward will be absorbed before taking a decisive plant. The stocks along the railroads are known to be large, and owners are in a measure undetermined as to the
