

A STOCK-RATE WAR BEGINS.

The Iowa Roads Commence Slaughtering Rates Between Omaha and Chicago.

A BIG CANNING FACTORY.

Another Evidence of Omaha's Boom—Troops Arriving—Lipton's Packing House—Police Points—Other Local.

Cutting Stock Rates.

For some time past it has been generally understood, by those who were on the inside track, that a quiet cut was being made on the live stock rates between Omaha and Chicago.

On Saturday the war on rates was made open and one road offered to haul stock to Chicago for \$20 and another for \$25, the regular tariff rate being on an average of \$35.

The prospects are that there will be a still further increase, because as a representative of one of the roads said to a Bee reporter yesterday "the greatest demoralization in freight rates exists among all the roads."

But this is not all. Some of the eastern roads have gone into the hog buying business. A well posted stockman told the story to a reporter in this wise: The hog market in Omaha has commenced such good prices that shippers all over the state have been sending in their hogs in hundreds of car loads.

But the funniest feature of this whole transaction," continued the reporter's informant, "is the way that the Burlington put its foot into it. The officials of that road saw how things were going and determined to embark in the hog buying business, too."

One of their first maneuvers was to purchase a lot of hogs which had been shipped to Omaha from Creston, 100 miles (paying regular local prices) then ship them back, via Creston, to Chicago, for sale in the stock market there.

LIPTON'S HOUSE.

Work Begun Upon it Yesterday at the Stock Yards. On Saturday last the contract for the erection of the new packing house of Thos. Lipton was let by the South Omaha Cattle Yards company to Messrs. Delaney & Riley, with the understanding that it will be completed by the 1st of October.

2. The neighborhood is especially a residence locality and hundreds of children go to and from school on the street passing this building.
