SHORTS FRANTICALLY COVER.

Wheat Also on the Upturn With Strong Feeling and Heavy Trading-Provisions Active-The Cattle Market Slow.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

Chicago, July 27 .- | Special Telegram to the BEE |- Cons-Corn was a full cent above last night's "call" price early on the curb this orning, the September option selling to 44c Car lots were smaller a good deal than ex-pected, there being only 556 cars of corn. When a regular board opened the Babel was so terrific and the corn pit so overcrowded that the price was at all sorts of figures on different sides of the pit. Excited traders rushed out of the jam and reported that the September option was at 41%c. The official reporter got it up to 44c. Undoubtedly however, there were wild trades as high as 44) c. Werst, the crop expert, reports to Baldwin, Wrenn & Farnum: "Permanent injury to the corn crop south and west of Chicago is certain, but the percentage is hard to determine even approximately until earing is complete. I consider 20 per cent worthless m Kansas; 39 per cent, more is injured somewhat by the drought and bugs. It is, however, astonishing to see how it has recuperated in countles where it has had rains within the past few days. The remaining 50 per cent is likely to make good corn unless the drought continues east of a line drawn north and south of Wanego. West of this line rains now, I think, have been sufficient to insure crops excepting in that injured as above described." The receipts were 432 cars, this inspection covering two days, which was under the estimate. From the opening at 45½ there was a pretty steady advance to 44½c, then a reaction to 45½c, and again an unward spurt to 44½c. The low point was ½c off from the opening. Such local shorts as were out in corn were extremely nervous and rushed to cover in such a frante manner as rushed to cover in such a frantic manner as to be detrimental to their, own interests. St. Louis was a moderate buyer in the corn pit. The excitement wore away toward noon, but the close was very firm. Trading was active all through the session and aggregated an enormous amount. WHEAT-An advance was made by wheat

and fairly well sustained. The boom in corn gave local traders an excuse for buying, and outsiders for sending in pretty fair-sized orders. September opened at 75½c, sold as high as 77½c, then off to 77¼c and up to 78c, where it stood a little before the close, though only for a moment. New York sent in some big orders and foreign houses covered a good many lines of shorts. The change in the visible supply figures in which wheat was made to be a property of 2005 (01) has inmade to show an increase of 2,058,000 bn., in-stead of 3,100,000 bu., as announced yester-day, had but little effect on the market. The close was strong and active at top prices. Provisions—Pork was active and stronger, September picking up from \$9.65 to \$9.95 and maintaining all the advance. CHICAGO LIVE STOCK.

CHICAGO, July 27 .- [Special Telegram to the BEE.]-CATTLE-The market to-day was very slow, and at the outset there was a rather demoralized feeling among salesmen. The quality of cattle was poor. There was a rush of thin and grassy light cattle, besides many coarse, heavy brutes which nobody wanted. Inferior light cattle came to the market partly because we have for some time been complaining of the demand for heavy stock and quoting the best demand for "little cattle," Little cattle, if fat and solid, having been made so on dry food, are all right, but the thin and grassy kinds are simply not wanted. There was one lot of yery fine and smooth dry-fed steers, averaging about 1300 Binoth dry-fed steers, averaging about 1300 lbs, which sold at \$1.87\%, but cattle of such good quality are extremely 1 ard to duplicate, while 1200 to 1300-lb cattle at about \$4.60 were quite plentiful, and there were not a few of such weights that were not worth \$4.00. The market to-day was generally lower, salesmen differing widely. The average decline was 10c and prices were fully 20c lower than last Friday.
