

STRIPPING FOR THE FAIR.

Lincoln People Exerting Themselves to Their Utmost for the Great Event.

THE PREPARATIONS COMPLETE.

THE BEE'S LINCOLN REPORT.

Lincoln people have fairly awakened to the fact that another fair is upon them, and one prominent business man remarked yesterday that "his coat was off to stay until the fair closed." There are a great many Lincoln people who feel the same enthusiasm, and it is creditable to the city to note the fact that nothing has been left in any year undone on their part that would contribute to the entire success of the state exhibition. The people of the capital city, in the light of former experience, are preparing to care for the multitudes that are expected, and to this end business men are buying lots for their places of business, so that when the hotels are flowing over with humanity that places for rest can be secured by those who come from a distance.

"There need be no fear," said a Lincoln fair man, "but what every one who visits the fair, great or small, can have plenty to eat and a comfortable place to sleep. Tell the people this," he continued, and it is told.

Out at the fair grounds the activity in improvements increases daily and the work of preparation goes bravely on.

Secretary Farnas will open his office in the city at the capital hotel building on the day of the fair, when it will be found at any time thereafter. Already stock men are visiting the city and the fair grounds to see that stalls and accommodations are in readiness, and many exhibitors have had their room in this time secured for months. The state fair may not have the greatest races in the land, nor the greatest of attractions in the amusement line, but it is safe to say that the exhibits of the world's fair like products of the state will equal any like exhibit ever held west of the Missouri river.

The board of managers at their last meeting reported that the volume of farm exhibits from the western countries of the state would be the greatest by one half ever shown before.

One of the managers expressed the opinion that one-third of the farm products shown would be grown west of the 100 meridian, where President Hayes said they would never grow.
