THE BULLS GET THEIR DEAL

They Make a Lively Turn in Pork and Other Articles,

WHEAT PRICES HELD UP STEADY.

The Government's Report Favorable to the Bears-Poorer Trading Towards the Close-The Cattle Market Improved.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

Cincago, Sept. 10. - [Special Telegram to the Bgr.]—The gatlery was erowded this morning with several hundred stranger who came in to see the buils in the pork pit before going to the state fair. There was probably no intended coincidence, but it is true, nevertheless, that they could not have seen pork bulls to better advantage if they had come in the building every day for the last month. October pork was up to \$10.75, with George Baldwin and others, presumably acting for big holders, bidding this figure, without getting much either. The bears, who were making so much funat the Armour circular while the price was going down from \$10,45 to \$10,10, were very glum, while brokers on the other side did all the shouting over the "circular" and rubbed it in In other ways. Ribs were sent above \$7,00 for October.

The signal service office reports tempera ture was down to freezing point in Manitoba. and that cold weather was to follow in the wake of the storm. There were also only 400 cars of corn received, 150 less than were antleipated yesterday. For the week it has been talked that the loadings on the corn roads were falling off. This was the first verification of it. The October option was up to 41%c.

Wheat was higher at the start, along with everything else. Cables even were better. It began to look as if Leopold Bloom, who took on 100,000,000 bushels of wheat yesterday and who took calls on nearly as much more after the close, would get the best of the raiders who undertook yesterday to shake him out. October started at 78%c. For the last half of the session the pits were dull and brokers did not want to operate until they knew what the government report would be. It was guessed before it was out that it would be a bear document. If it had not been for purchases by Hutchinson the price would have slid down again. But he bought probably 909,000 bushels to cover his October sales, his brokers filling up card after card. This held Chicago up above 78e for a long while, although all other surrounding markets were weak and lower. The decrease in receipts this week has been more in western than in native cattle, but when rangers are here they displace natives, so it amounts to about the same thing in the long run.
