But an equal division of the vote, based on the first election, will throw out Battle Creek, which will leave the contest between Norfolk and Madison.

BIG RAILROAD SUIT. The Nickel Plate Contest Begun in the

Cleveland Courts. CLEVELAND, Sept. 14 .- The trial of the

great three-cornered Nickel Plate foreclosure suit was begun in the common pleas court here to-day. Millions of dollars are involved

in the case. The validity of the first mortgage bonds, amounting to \$15,000,000, repre sented by the Central Trust company of New York, is backed by various defendants, creditors of the road, on the ground that the Nickel Plate railroad, which claims to be a consolidation corporation, composed of five consolidation corporation, composed of five separate corporations, never became properly or lawfully consolidated into such corpora-tion, by the facts and condition of things ex-isting dal not authorize it; as no law author-ized the consolidation of the company in this state with states adjoining, and that the advantaged extraction theorem and not icknowledged corporation therefore had no sover to make a mortgage. It is also chaimed by the contestants that the mortgage was randulent and that the large amount of

bonds secured thereby were showed to mem-bers of the syndicate, who formed a pool to construct the road without consideration, and that the road never received one-third in value of the amount of the bonds, stock and preferred stocks issued to members of said syndicate. All the charges are controverted on behalf of the bond holders.


