The Pork Deal Progresses Excitedly and Causes Considerable Uncertainty.

SOME THINK THE DEAL CLOSED.

The Dullest Day in Wheat Trading for Months-Corn Also Inactive and Lower-The Cattle Market.

ON CHICAGO CHANGE.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15 .- [Special Telegram to the BEE.]--The pork pit was the center of interest and excitement again to day. It was jammed so full at the opening that trading for a minute was of all sorts and at all prices. October pork sold certainly as low as \$11.00. It is altogether likely that at the same in stant other brokers were paying \$11.10 for the same option. It got back to \$11.20. There were shorts in the pit who didn't know whether to fill or not, and longs who had bought yesterday and who had suffered over night. Armour never has much company in his deals. He shakes out and befuddles the strong and weak. One of the stories going around now is that Norman Ream is short and that he will be given treatment. Ream ought to know a thing or two, however. He made his first big stake as a trader for Armour in the biggest pork corner that was ever run before or since. Everybody expects a wild market, with rushes up and with terrific downward slides. But the deal is just begun. Everybody knows that, too. Would Armour be hurrying meats out of here at the rate of 1,000,000 pounds a day if the shorts were to be let off for October shortage? Well, it is the fashion in every squeeze to declare that there is not any shortage. But didn't the Chicago Packing company pay \$0.62% for 1,500,000 pounds of the October ribs yesterday? Didn't those ribs cost them \$7,500 more yesterday than they would have cost two days earlier? These are the questions asked on 'change, October pork, in an hour after the opening, was down to \$10.85, and everybody declaring that the deal was over. Then it went back above \$11.00 again For a while the "tailers" were pretty well out. There were a good many others who had not only sold out but had gone short besides. In wheat there has not been such a bad In wheat there has not been such a bad day for traders in months. The market soon broke through the "put" price, and those who had sold "puts" were sellers of wheat. New York was unloading "long" and selling "short" wheat. The report came from the northwest that farmers were in a sort of name to set their grain purketed and sort of panic to get their grain marketed and that there was a scramble to get to station: ber sold down to 7014c and stuck there for a while. Then it broke to 76c, and then a frac-

while. Then it broke to 76c, and then a fraction under it. There was no big trading and selling came from all quarters. Leopold Bloom is supposed to have been caught "long" of wheat and to be a seller.
