

WHEAT ON THE UPWARD MOVE

Prices of the Leading Cereal Advance on Encouraging Reports.

CORN ALSO BOOSTED HIGHER

But Slight Changes Recorded in the Provision Market—Poor Demand for American Wheat in England—Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—[Special Telegram to the BELL.]—Values on exchange this morning started out at substantially the same points at which they stopped last night. Wheat was a shade better, but it did not keep the improvement. The first sales in November were at 73 1/2c, the second at 73c, and the third recovered to 73 1/2c. There continued the early fluctuations. Cables continued slow and quiet, but sales were made at 40c, 40 1/2c, 41c and 41 1/2c.

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CHICAGO LIVE STOCK.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—[Special Telegram to the BELL.]—CATTLE—Fat shipping cattle of good quality sold at steady prices, while the general run of cattle were dull and lower. This and rough grades were extremely hard to sell, though there was no quotable change in the general market for fat beef. The strike of Armour's beef men took a big buyer out of the market, and in case his 2,000 cattle of all kinds cannot be slaughtered, they will probably be thrown back on the market. The market this week has not been very active, and business has not been interrupted nearly as much as was expected. Shipping steers, 1,250 to 1,550 lbs. \$3.00 to \$3.30; 1,350 to 1,550 lbs. \$2.80 to \$3.20.
