COUNCIL BLUFFS. The New Ordinance As Agreed To and As It

LEMEN'S TRUSTEES RESIGN.

Four of Them Unite In a Verdict Against the Home of the Friendless-Dr. Cross at Red Oak-Odd Fellows' Banquet.

The Bridge Ordinance. The following is the ordinance as

agreed upon by the council and by those interested in the bridge company, and which will be passed at the next regular meeting in substantially this form. It should be read with carefulness by all the voters, that they may act intelligently upon the matter:

An ordinance authorizing the Omaha & Council Bluffs Railway & Bridge company to construct, operate and maintain street railreads in the city o Council Bluffs, and defining the powers and duties of said

defining the powers and duties of said company.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Council Bluffs, that consent, permission and authority is hereby given and granted to, and vested in the Omaha and Council Bluffs Raliway & Bridge company, and its successors and assigns, to construct, equip, maintain and operate, for the term of twenty-five years, upon the conditions hereinafter found, a single or double track street railway, with the necessary switches, turnouts, and side tracks along and over the streets, alicys, avenues and bridges of and within the city of Council Bluffs, hereinafter designated, and such other streets, avenues and alleys of said city as said company may hereafter select, with the consent and approval of said city. And in constructing and operating said railway said company shall have the right to intersect and cross the track or tracks of any street or other railway, and the right to connect its main line with its dejots, stations, stables or car houses situated on any lot fronting on such main line, by a proper and suitable track laid thereto.

Sec. 2. The streets and avenues specifically

Sec. 2. The streets and avenues specifically referred to in section 1 in reof, are the following: Broadway street, from Missouri river to city limits, South First street, Graham avenue, High street from Graham avenue to Sixteenth avenue, Sixteenth avenue from Hi, h street to Third street, Third street from Sixteenth avenue to Tenth avenue, Tenth avenue from Third street to South Sixth street, and South Sixth street from Tenth street, and South Sixth street from Tenth avenue to Broadway street. Provided no steam motive power shall be used on any of said streets and avenues unam d, except on Broadway, west of Eleventh street.

Sec. 3. The tracks of said company shall be laid so as to conform to the established grade of any street on which the road may be built, wherever the city has, or hereafter shall establish such grade. Where the streets are not graded said company may lay its tracks so as to conform to the surface of such streets, but the same shall be made to conform to the established crade thereof, whenever the city shall establish the grade of such

ever the city shall establish the grade of such street, or any part thereof. In case the city at any time shall pave any street along week said railway may fun, said company shell at its own expense, at the same time, with the same material, pave the space between the rails of its track, and one foot outside of the rails, so that it shall substantially correspond with the paving of the street outside of the

Where tracks are laid upon a street already Where tracks are laid upon a street already paved, the company shall pay the property owners abutting for the paving within the rails and one foot outside thereof; and in laying its tracks said company shall restore all streets, whether paved or not, to as good condition as before the laying down of its track thereon, and shall conform to all grades and keep water weys and culverts in good repair, at its own expense, for the passage of water along or across its tracks.

Sec. 4. The city of Council Bluffs shall be held in no manner liable to said company for any damage that may be occasioned by the breakage of any gas or water pipes, or for any delays that may be occasioned by the obstruction of sewers, laying of water or gas pipes, or the necessary repairing of the same, or from the improvements or repairs of any street, or damages to property owners along streets where tracks may be laid down by said company.

tion and passage of this ordinance. And that said company be, and is hereby prohibited from leasing said high bridge for any other railway purposes than for street railways. That the said company shall in no case charge each passenger carried on said railway, and across said bridge from any part of its street railway lines in the city of Council Bluffs to Omaha, to exceed five (5) cents for each person; and not to exceed five cents within the limits of the city of Council Bluffs.

Sec. 7. That the failure of said company to complete the laying down and equ pment of the street railway track, and the construction of said bridge, within the time as provided in this ordinance, shall operate as a full for-feiture of all right of said company to receive or have paid over to it any part or por-tion of the said tax voted and donated by the freehold resident taxpayers of said city, as provided in chapter 13, of the laws of Iowa of

Sec. 8. And be it further ordained that said street railway shall connect with and be operated over and across the highway bridge when constructed across the Missouri river between Council Bluffs and Omaha, said bridge to be a high bridge, as defined by act of congress for construction of the same. Said bridge to be used and operated solely and exclusively as a street railway, highway, public travel and wagon bridge. Provided further that in case the said bridge company, or their successors or assigns, shall use or attempt to use said high bridge for any other purpose than herein granted, all rights hereby purpose than herein granted, all rights hereby conferred or granted to said bridge company shall be forfeited, and all rights under this ordinance shall become null and void.

Cannot Endorse the Home. The affairs of the home of the friendless have been allowed to rest for some time past, not because there had been any material bettering of their condition, but necause the public had been pretty well tired out with the details as brought forward by the investigation held in this city. It was generally understood at the time of the investigation that the manager pleaded with the board of trustees to let him down easy, promising to resign voluntarily, and turning over the property to the board. The members of the board not desiring to subject him to any undue harshness attempted to patch up a verdict, which would neither endorse him or remove him, they expecting that he would remove himself, and thus the matter could be adjusted without further un-pleasant notoriety. All Objections Removed.

The Knights of Labor held a meeting Wednesday evening, at which consider able time was spent in discussing the project for a wagon and street car bridge. There was a strong sentiment in favor of the enterprise, and in favor of voting the desired aid, provided that the city council would throw certain protections about the interests of the city. They did not want to have aid voted for a railway bridge, as they believed that the railway companies could build their own bridges. While confidence was expressed in the citizens who were moving in the matter, and while it was to be believed that they were acting in good faith, and for the interests of the city, still there was doubt as to whether these citizens would not be frozen out, or voted out, or schemed out, and the enterprise thus get into the railways, who would thus get the money voted by the city. Such seemed the chief objection and only fear. Some wanted the tolls fixed at less than the rates named, but there was less stress laid on this point than on the other, as it was deemed that the matter of rates would necessarily be arranged so as to secure the largest possible amount of travel over the bridge. Many expressed themselves as willing to vote for the enter-prise if these matters could be more delimitely arranged. As stated in yester-day's Bas, the council and the bridge company have agreed to conditions which do away with both objections, and an ordinance will be passed before elec-

tion day which will satisfy these citizens. Another guarantee of the assertion that it will under no conditions ever be a railway bridge is that the Omaha end of the line will strike into Farnam street, and it would be practicably impossible to get in there with railway trains. The ordinance as agreed to by all concerned, and which will be passed by the council at its meeting before election, is given in another column, and can be perused and discussed freely before the aid is voted. It seems evident that the projectors of the bridge entersonable conditions by which the rights of the people can be guaranteed, and the intentions of the voters fully realized. With this clear understanding it is thought there will be a general support of the enterprise, as it is generally con-ceded that such a bridge as is contemplated would be of great value to Coun-

The Trial of Dr. Cross. A report has got into circulation, and crept into the columns of the careless class of papers, that Dr. Cross, who killed Dr. McKune, had been taken to Red Oak, and that he would be tried there at once. The starter for this report is the fact that Dr. Cross had been brought from the penitentiary at Fort Madison to the jail at Red Oak, under a recent order of the court, it being deemed that the penitentiary was not the place for his continement, but that he should be kept in the jail of the county where he is to be tried. The trial will not take place until the first term of the district court in 1897. Just when that term will be held is not known with certainty, as the assignments are not made out. It is not at all likely that Dr. Cross will be able to give bail, so he will remain in the jail at Red Oak until his trial, which will be several months yet. His former counsel have withdrawn from the case, and his attorneys now are Judge Larimer, Smith Mer herson and J. Y. Stone.
