Cattle Offerings Fairly Large and at Strong Prices-The Hog Market Active and Higher-General Quotations.

CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

Chicago, Oct. 29.-(Special Telegram to the PEE. |-There was more weakness than strength in the early market, and prices in wheat were easier by %c than they closed last night. December opened on the regular board at 75c, and for the first few minutes kept very close around that figure, but finally dropped back to 7436c. May corn opened 14c lower at 43%c, and January pork 23%c off at \$10.05. The early tendency in everything was downward. Corn broke off rapidly from 42%c to 42%c under heavy sales. Macfarland started the break by offering 25,000 bushel lots. About the same quantities were sold by Jones and others, and soon the unloading became very general. Cables on Indian corn were id lower, and helped the local depress on. Up to 10:30 wheat showed no dis position to below 743ge; in fact, it stuck between that and 75c with marked persistency. Pork was a slow deal, January selling off to \$10.02)4. but recovering a shade. It did not take May corn long to get down to 42c under the depressing influence of heavy offerings, and by noon this was the ruling price, though not much stuff was changing hands. Wheat did about all its fluctuating up to 12:30 o'cleck between 74%c and 75c, being at the lower figure more frequently than at the nigher one. Mr. Ream came out during the day with a flat statement that he was not a bull on wheat, though for some reasons he did not like to be put down as being in favor of lower prices. He thought, how-ever, they were inevitable and that trade might as well make up its mind to a cheaper market. Trade was of a very desultory char-acter and indulged in chiefly by local lights. Acter and indulged in chiefly by local lights. Yesterday on the afternoon board, the corn pit was electrified by Norton & Worth'n zton buyign 1,000,000 bushels of corn inside of five minutes. The buying was done, too, in a way to advance the price, and with no idee, plainly, of buying catefully. May corn was run up from 423,@433c, and then the firm turned around and sold just as wildly. The whole transaction was a mystery until this morning. It now turns out that it was a big job set up on the bucket shops and probably covset up on the bucket shops and probably covered the whole country. The clique bought corn at Kansas City and Chicago. New York eorn at Kansas City and Chicago. New York and elsewhere in bucket shops at about 42c for May. They then directed Norton & Worthington to a trance the market here, undoubtedly ably protecting the firm with margins. The time selected was the short afternoon board. The price was run up a cent in five minutes. Trades at the "bucket shops" were all ordered closed at the top. At Kansas City, however, this morning, a big "bucket shop" proprietor refused to pay, and claimed that it was a set up job.
