## HOWE'S LOVE FOR LINCOLN.

A Scheme of the Nebraska Boodler to Bleed Lincoln Property Owners.

A GIRL ATTEMPTS SUICIDE.

Criminal Matters-J. Sterling Morton Speaks to the Democrats at Their First and Only Meeting-Topics of the Day.

IFROM THE BEE'S LINCOLN BURBAUA Church Howe isn't reputed much of a lawyer, and the court dockets in his own county are not gorged with cases in which Howe is attorney of record, Neither are the dockets covered with cases in which Howe is an attorney. In fact the dockets of Lancaster county might be searched for years back without finding any signs of Howe's name except in one instance, and that instance is a glorious illustration of Church Howe's love for Lincoln-an illustration of his great love in other particulars, his love for bleeding the citizens. Church Howe's name looms up on the appearance docket of the Lancaster district court as attorney of the Board of Church extension of the Protestant Methodist church against J. D. Johnson, a citizen of Lincoln, who is only one of hundreds whose property would be placed in jeopardy if there was any law or equity in the case that Church Howe has come up into Lancaster county and the city of

Lincoln and has instituted against the owners. That the case a worthless one without shadow of foundation and instituted on the beat order is so prevalent an opinion with every Lincoln man at all acquainted with it, that the BEE has yet to hear a word in its favor. Howe's name is most approprintely connected with a case of this character and it shows the love he bears for Lincoln citizens when the only case he has in the courts here is one that causes people who have been in undisputed possession of their homes for years to take up a collection among themselves to hire attorneys to fight Howe's case in the courts. Mr. Johnson, the individual singled out for a test case, is only one of many whose title to property has a cloud cast upon it by Howe's scheme evidently hatched up down in Nemaha with a man named Young, who years before held a title to the ground that the records of the district court on trial showed had long since passed away from him. Young moved to Nemaha county some years ago where Howe has picked him up and used the ease that the district court has twice decided against them as a means of showing his great love to Lincoln. Mr. A. J. Sawyer in a public meeting Saturday evening before a thousand people said that the case had been offered to him and refused, and that Lincoln at-torneys knew of its shallowness. Messrs. Marquette, Dewees and Hall and Judge O. P. Mason attorneys against the case can tell any inquiring man just how much work it was to twice in district court with the use of but one witness to overthrow the case and get a judgment for the defendant against the scheme, and Mr. J. D. Johnson can tell just how much money Howe's case cost the parties whose property was endangered to fight and defeat it, all on account of the plaintiff's great love for Lincoln. It is stated as a matter of fact by prominent men in Lincoln that the organization, the board of church extension, in the name of which the case was brought has long since passed out of existence. All of which further lays bare the scheme of the chief attorney in the case to bleed the

owners of the property. The record in this case, taken from the record books and papers in the district court, show that summons were issued in February, 1884. That on March 11 it was tried to the court that the defense superned but one witness, the county clerk, and that the court found for the defendant, Mr. Johnson, that he had the legal title to the property and was entitled to its possession. The plaintiff, Church Howe, leading attorney, not satisfied with this asked and obtained a new trial. On November 14, O. A. Mullon was appointed to take the testimony in the case and on April 6, 1885, it was tried to the court, the verdict being entered up April 17, 1885, in the following strong language: "The court being advised in the premises doth find for the defendant upon the issues joined, and that at the commencement of this action the defend-ant had and still has the legal title and estate to the property described in the petition; that the plaintiff had no in-terest or estate whatever therein; that defendant is the owner absolutely, that the plaintiff take nothing by this that the defendant go hence without delay and have and recover from this plaintiff the costs expended in his behalf, taxed at \$44.25." It might be well to interject at this point that these costs have not as yet been paid and it looks as though Howe differs somewhat in this respect from Jones, of Binghamp-

It would further seem that Howe with his scheme ought to be satisfied with two separate and distinct trials in the district court, both of them square against him, but he evidently was not for the case was taken to the supreme court where it stands on the docket to-day with Howe's name as leading attorney, a standing menace to the title of a large amount of Lincoln property, and an advertisement to the public at large that to these numerous property holders there is a cloud upon the title to their homes. It will be remembered that the first trial at suicide in this present state of excitement proved fatal, but instead of its being a warning it seemed to be a proper up the minds of some it seemed to harrow up the minds of some weak girls to follow her example.

The History of Steel Pens. A Roman metal pen is said to have been found at Aosta, not a mere stylus, but a bronze pen slit, and there is some evidence of a pen or reed of bronze nearly as early as the invention of printnearly as early as the invention of printing in the lifteenth century. A hundred years ago some steel pens were made in Birmingham by Mr. Harrison for Dr. Priestly, and some of these passed into the hands of Sir Joseph Mason in his early days with Mr. Harrison, but all seem to be lost. The first pen of metal of a definite date, beyond all question, is one in a Dutch patent book of 1717. At about the same time a polite ode of Pope refers to a "steel and gold pen," but these were evidently luxuries only, and it was not until about fifty or sixty years ago that metalic pens became more generally in use. It was about 1823 or 1824 that the great revolution came by which pens were made by a cheaper process— the hand screw-press, which pierced the pens from sheet steel. Previously, pens had been made from steel rolled into tube fashion, and the joint formed the slit; but these required considerable labor to shape them into pen-form. The use of the screw-press belongs to the period of John Mitchell, Joseph Gillot and Josiah Mason; but on a careful review of the facts, it seems to be clear that John Mitchell has the best claim to be considered as the original introducer of press-made pens Skinner, of Sheffield, was apparently one of the first to cheapen steel pens, but his productions were soon surpassed when the screw-press was in-
