Sam Jones' Sermon at the Exposition Building Last Night. A COMMON EVERY DAY TALK The Board of Education-Amending the Charter-A Policeman Suspended-The Lauer Trial-Other Local

Last night about three thousand persons assembled in the exposition building to listen to Sam Jones. The weather without was chilly, and had a sensible effect in retarding the number of auditors from that of the night before.

The exercises were opened by Mr. Maxwell announcing "Praise God, From Whom All Blessings Flow." Rev. Mr. Mudd offered prayer. This was followed by the hymn, "Ring the Bells of Heaven," sung in unison.

Mr. Jones then rendered "Happy as the Day is This," one of Mr. Maxwell's compositions. It is a familiar southern air, and is very good. There, was sung in unison, "Rev. J. E. House followed with prayer, and to this succeeded, "Glory to His Name."

Mr. Jones then appeared accompanied by Mr. Excell. The former, looking rather weary and seemed to have lost some flesh, at least so far as his features were concerned, since his first appearance.

Mr. Excell's effort was, "He Saved a Poor Sinner Like Me." This was one of Mr. Excell's favorites, having already sung it during the revival.
