ACTIVITY AT THE TRANSFER

A Glimpse at the Track Laying and Bridge Work.

THE STREET CAR SYSTEM.

Colonel Keatley's Reply to Sovereign -A Young Man Who Will Fight For Old Ones - Personal Mention.

Busy Workers. The yards of the Union Pacific railway company in this city between what is known as the junction switch and the transfer is a very busy place and many improvements are in course of construction, but the improvements are by no means sairly begun yet. Work will

be continued through the winter mouths as far as possible, and by the opening of spring it is hoped that, so far as the new tracks are concerned, they will be ready to open for business.

NEW BUILDINGS. Several new buildings are now in course of erection, the foundations of several are completed and exeavations are being made for others. These new buildings above referred to are located directly west of the land office near the passenger depot, and consist of repair shops, sup, ly department, oil house, which is to be fire proof, and several small buildings. A boiler house for the purpose of heating the other buildings beside the freight offices, is also being built and the boiler is on the ground being placed in position. There will also be a large coal chute.

NEW BRIDGES.
South of the old bridge in the freight yards, there have been three new bridges put in, and north of the old bridge, between it and the passenger bridge, four new bridges are being put up. North of the present passenger bridge six new bridges are to be put in, the grading having all been completed.
Since the new bridges have been com-

pleted in the freight yards the facilities are such that now six switch engines are abreast at work in the yards, and the cars that were blockaded in the freight vards during the building of these bridges are now being switched out rapidly and sent west. At one time during the recent blockade there were nearly 4,000 freight cars in the yards THE CHANGE OF TRACKS.

When the new tracks are put in the junction switch will be removed 400 feet west of its present location. The grades for these new tracks have been completed, and all that now remains is to lay

the ties and the iron.

There will be two dummy train tracks run from the new junction up as far as the Tenth avenue crossing, and from them up to Broadway depot will be only one track. These tracks will be as straight as possible, the curve at the juncture, and the one just east of the transfer, being the only ones on the entire line, thereby insuring greater speed.

There will also be a double track from the junction to the passenger transfer with the only curve at the junction. The tracks in the passenger yards will be straightened and thereby increase the facilities for making better time between this city and Omaha. The ice houses west of the passenger
