#### THEY COULDN'T MAKE A BREAK

Safe Blowers Get Pairly at Work, But Get Frightened Away.

ANOTHER JIM CUMMINGS LETTER

The Superior Court Still Sifting Dirt -The Christian Young Men To-Night--The Doings of the Aldermen Last Night.

Frightened Safe Blowers.

The number of burglaries in this city recently have been very few, notwithstanding the statement of the Council Bluff correspondent of the Register, who claimed this to be a "paradise for thieves and thugs," but no such thing as safe blowers have come to light for a long while until yesterday morning, when it was discovered that an attack had been made upon the safe of E. L. Landsberg, a grocer at No. 162 Broadway. On awakening Mr. Landsberg, who re-

sides in the rooms above his store, was mystified at being unable to get out of his apartments, and after being confined in his rooms for an hour or so finally forced his door open enough to discover that his door was tied on the outside, and procuring a knife he proceeded to cut the string which released him and on going down stairs leased him, and ou going down-stairs discovered that burglars had been at

work on his safe.

Investigation showed that the thieves had forced the latch from off the window, which is some eight feet above the ground in the rear of the store, and with a chisel had raised the window, which gave them immediate entrance, and with the safe which was ManNall & Urban's the safe, which was MacNeal & Urban's make, only six feet away and no light in the store, they began operations. They bored with a quarter-inch drill, and only succeeded in drilling about an inch, when for some reason best known to themselves, quit without further damage.

It is thought that they were professionals in their line and were aware of the habits of the proprietor. The string with which they fastened the door was secured in the store and after inserting a screw hook in the door easing they wrapped the string, which by about fifty strands had been formed into a rope; around the screw hook and door knoo. They also broke off the alarm cash drawer which was found within two feet of the front entrance but did not take something less than a dollar in change nor a two dollar bill which was in a tin box in the drawer. In fact, Mr. Landsberg can find nothing missing and concludes he was very fortunate as several hundred dollars was in the safe.

The only explanation that can be offered as to the reason that they did not succeed in "blowing" the safe is, that about 3:45 o'clock Mr. Landsberg got up and built a fire in his rooms and the noise

might have frightened the thieves. Yesterday the grocer gave the merch ants police a job and hereafter his place will be under their protection.

Discussing Tenth Avenue.

Last night a meeting of the city council was had, at which the ordinance granting he Union Pacific the right of way up Tenth avenue, was considered. The ordinance was amended so as to give the right of way up the alley to Twelfth street, and thence along Tenth avenue, provided that the Union Pacific pay all damages before the track is laid.

George F. Wright represented the Union Pacific company as not understanding when the matter was first brought up that it would have to pay damages. The company claimed that the c.tizens' committee had agreed to give the company the right of way so as to get the desired depot at Main street. The company had not moved in the matter, but it was the outgrowth of the complaint made by the citizens before the lowa railway commis-sioners. Now the question of damages was brought up. The company was not willing to pay damages before it acquired any rights. With such an ordinance the property owners could stand in the way and block the whole matter unless they

got just what they asked.

Colonel Sapp, N. P. Dodge and W. A.

Mynster discussed the details. A number of property owners repeated their protests against the Union Pacific having the right of way unless they received just damages.

damages.

The city attorney expressed the opinion that it was useless to attempt to pass an ordinance which would interfere with the

statutory provisions for fixing damages. The law provided how damages could be secured. If the Union Pacific and the others interested wanted to enter into a contract concerning these damages they

could do so.

Mr. Wright said that the council could not pass an ordinance which would prevent law suits, if people wanted to sue.

Alderman Shugart, who did the most of the talking on the part of the council, seemed anxions to make an ordinance protecting the property owners and avoiding forcing them into law suits. The city attorney said that the council

could not make a contract between these parties in the form of an ordinance.

Mr. Wright agreed, on behalf of the
Union Pacific, that the company would
not use the avenue west of Twelfth street
for a year at least, but it would like to
have the ordinance provide the company
could have that part of the avenue, if it

baid damages.

The mayor said the Union Pacific said it did not want to come up the ayenue, and he did not see why the council shall throw out any more bait to tempt the company. The present ordinance to his mind was very liberal.

The council discussed the matter fur-

ther, but reached no definite conclusion, Aldermen Keller, Danforth and Ham-mer expressed themselves as opposed to the passage of the ordinance unless all damages were first filed. Adjournment was then taken until next Monday even-

The Robber Still Writing. A short time ago the Headlight, of Moberly. Mo., claimed to receive a letter from Jim Commings, the reputed express robber, and that it bore the postmark of Council Bluffs. A search was made in this city for traces of the fellow's where abouts, but little could be learned. The sensation caused by the letter and its contents has just died away, when yesterday there appeared in this postoffice another letter, bearing indications of being from the same Jim Cummings. It was mailed at Logan yesterday, and came in here yesterday morning. It was directed to "W. J. Davis, Moberly, Mo., Moberly Headlight." The writing on the envelope was compared with that of the letter received before, and which has been sent over the country in lithograph fac simile. There were many points of similarity, and the postoffice clerks ex-amined it letter by letter with great care. The similarity was very marked, and those who made a critical examination of the address were certain that it was written by the same person who wrote the other sensational letter. The envelope being

sealed their curiosity could not be well satisfied, and the letter was sent on its way. It seems that it is highly probable that some sensational loving fellow has written these letters for the special purpose of creating a stir, and it is equally improbable that Jim Cummings, if he has as he says in the letter got away with this big amount of money, would jeopardize his safety by writing letters and openly mailing them.


