## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

A Bearish Feeling Prevalent Among the Crowd in the Wheat Pit.

TIGHTNESS IN MONEY THE CAUSE

Provisions Rule Fairly Steady-A More Favorable Outlook For Cattle -Hog Values the Same as on Saturday-Quotations.

### CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 .- [Special Telegram to the BEE.]-The wheat market opened this morning at a slight decline. The Chicago growd felt bearish, and the whole west seemed to share the feeling to a certain extent. The east, on the other hand, was bullish in sentiment, though it was noticed that there were fewer than usual buying orders from that direction. Cables, public and private, were firm and indicative of a continuation of the improvement abroad. Export clearances from Atlantic ports for last week were reported at 2,025,000 bushels of wheat and corn. Tight money here and in the northwest may be held responsible in a large degree for the weak feeling in this section. Banks are holding borrowers down and an increasing difficulty in obtaining money for the carrying of grain is reported. The depressing influence of this sort of thing is severely felt, and to the same cause is attributed the present increase in the movement of wheat in the direction of Chicago. where money is much cheaper than in Minneapolis, Duluth or the back country. In the wheat pit trade was of a lighter volume than on any of the days of last week and the tendency of prices seemed to be downward. Several times during the morning May touched 8514c and once it sold down to 85% @8514c. The 1 o'clock closing was 85% @ 6% c. Reported new business from New York and Baltimore aggregating 240,000 bushels and acceptance as true of the statement that 300,000 bushels of wheat shipped out Saturday would appear in to-morrow evening's totals, served to harden values somewhat towards the end of the long session. Some private cables received late were also stronger. Northwestern advices, however, were that the receipts at points of accumulation would be heavy for several days. At the end the feeling was as weak as at the beginning and prices were 1/20 off as compared ginning and prices were 15c off as compared with Saturday. There was a good trade in corn, but the market was withal rather quiet and prices, generally speaking, well main-tained through the session.
