MEILHAC'S WORKS AND WAYS.

Carlotta Patti Blossoms Out as Music Teacher-More About the

Declaimer of 'Ostler Joe.

Parts. Dec. 17 .- [Correspondence of the BER.]-Henri Mellnae, the world-regowned dramatic author, is one of the choicest, nicest, and kindest men imaginable. When I first met him I looked with no fittle curiosity at one whose talent had made two, nearly three, decades of men and women alternately laugh and ery. He is brimful of humor, his conversation is lively and witty, and his laugh in itself perfect contagion. Once only I have seen him when he was less gay, and that was at the time his literary Siamese-twin, Halevy, was elected to the French Academy. Meilbac didn't say what was the matter; but an observer with half an eye could see that he was human enough to take such a separation from his old friend very deeply to heart. However much anyone might accaus Meilhac of sensitiveness, none could accuse him of either malace or jealousy, end I believe no one at heart more rejoiced at Ludovic Halevy's success than this same old composion and co-worker. Meilhae is dark and sout, with fine, bright and piercing eyes as black as jet. His mouth is pleasant and half veiled by a dark horse-shoe moustache, while an imperial of the same color, perhaps a shade darker, falls on the full chin and fuller lower jaw. He is about fifty years of age, works very hard, and is so fond of cards and play that he turns night into day. His rooms, or apartments, are situated in the heart of Paris at No. 10, Place de la Madeleine, fronting on the place and bouleyard. His suite of apartments looks out on one of the finest views in the city. I have often seen people stare up at that seductive-looking balcony, glance with eager curiosity at the veiled windows and fine lace curtains, and after the answered query: "I wonder who lives there?" remark: "Well, that is about one of the most fetching apartments to look at in all Paris, and I am not surprised to

find that it is occupied by a man like

Meilbac

The interior is richly but simply furnished: one great room is devoted to bilhards and a mammoth bithard table; another, the corner cupboard, or boudoir, where the author writes, is used as a library. It is simply one of the costest places in the world, and one must be hard pushed who couldn't find something to write about in such a den. Meilhac takes forever to write a piece. He constructs, reconstructs, builds and tears down with a patience and enthusiasm truly remarkable. His hand-writing in his plays is very tine and very difficult to the sheets look like mysterious state documents, and in some way bear one and all the impress of unusual value these manuscripts of course are copied and the originals remain in the author's hands. In fact, it is the very place for them to remain, as I much doubt any one being able, or at least having the pa tience to enumerate them, read them, or even to make them out. careful a composer that he polishes and repolishes to a degree positively maddening. He is never content with his work. He will leave a piece with a manager perfect, so to speak; the poor director wil flatter himself that at last he has got hold of his author, when a ring at his door-bell between the hours of 2 and 5 a. m., will announce a basty message from one other artist

> This conscientiousness is the reason why managers always "spring" their premieres on him, when he least expects Gotte, his last work, just produced at the Palais Royal, was announced fully three days before the author had intended; he left the theatre, went home intending to make still more changes mind: at 12 o'clock the following morning he read the announcement of the first performance of his piece for that night— and nearly had a fit. He was as nervous over the set of her wedding gown. Poor Meithac! He will never get over this feeling, were he to write forever, and live at least two thousand years. He is very rich, but high play thins his exchecquer. He gives to every one, and his heart is as generous as his lyrics. A celebrated writer said to me: "What do you think Medhac's royalties were last forty thousand francs a month. ? Starving artists have a true friend in this man, and not a few Americans have felt the benefit both of his purse and his friendsnip. His modesty is really incredible I have met him a dozen times but never heard him speak a word about himself. He is certainly one of the most remark able men of the nineteenth century. In fact his talent is such that one day he will be America's Bonheur. Forgive the punster but remember the pun. Henry Bisbing, if I mistake not, has a fine future before him, for he has great natural gifts, which have been strength ened by an admirable and thorough technical training. Mr. Bisbing was born in the Quaker City about twenty five years ago. He studied there in the fine arts academy, and by the advice of John Sartain, a celebrated engraver, did illustrating work for the Aldine Press, the Art Journal, and other publications. The Appletons gave him their American Homes to illustrate, and he made a brilliant success with that series. In 1876 he came abroad, studied in the royal academy of Munich, thence went to Brussels, where he found the celebrated American animal painter, J. H. L. de Hans. In 1883 he studied at Paris, with F. de Vuillefroy, and the fol-lowing year had two fine studies hung on the line at the Salon. The Versailles Society of Arts has just awarded him a first-class medal for one of the finest bits of eattle painting I have ever seen. At Mr. Tooth's late exhibition in London, Mr. Bisbing was again represented by In the Polders. The Saturday Review, in speaking of the exhibition, mentions Mr. Bisbing's picture along with the works of Meissonnier, Benjamin Constant, and one other artist, whose name I do not re-call, and says: "These four works seem

to us the cream of the gallery." Mr. Bisbing is at work upon a le canvas, which he will send to the Salon of 1887. The composition is splendid in conception and not without a comical vein; a powerful buil, standing near others of its kind, is utilizing a rustic gate for the unpoetic, but necessary pastime of scratching his neck. He does it so vigorously and well, that to see him is to feel the immediate necessity ofwell agitating the surface of your skin.
