CHICAGO, Jan. 14.- | Special Telegram to the BEE. |-The wily countryman has again hidden his hogs, or at least all his fat hogs, and is smiling as prices go up at the stock yards. There were only 17,000 head there this morning where 25,000 were expected. and as a result prices were 100215c per 100 higher, and all hog scalpers were happy. The effect on the board was an advance in the price of pork to \$12,25. The "talent," which has been selling more vigorously at \$11.85@12.10 than ever it did when May pork was at \$13,00, was again feeling very unhappy. Countrymen, such of them as fringed the pork pit, all looked gratified. The whole advance did not last long. The May option was off to \$12.15 within the first fifteen minutes. It was a bull day for provisions, how ever, and \$12.25 was after all a popular figure for May pork. After the first little fluctuation at the opening \$12,25 was reached again, and was not again departed from very far or very long. The feature of the wheat pit for a week has been the very heavy and steady buying or Field, Lindley & Co. They have bought right straight along without selling until, with all the quarter million lots and half million lots added together, they must hold a great lot of the grain. It is thought that this buying has been for California. News from this quarter cut a figure to-day. Wheat on the coast is reported to have advanced life por bushel on the drought and dispatches said that if the dryness continued there would be no grain for export. There was a great deal of short wheat covered this forenoon. Some put it as high as 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 bushels. The buyers were Ream, Bloom, Gifford and others of the big traders.
