## CALIFORNIA WHEAT TALK.

Pacific Coast News Affecting Prices All Over the World.

CORN SLOW AND SMALL TRADING

Pork Rules Stronger During the Entire Session-The Supply of Cattle Liberal-Hogs Fairly Active-Quotations.

#### CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21 .- [Special Telegram to the BEE. |-There is plenty of rain in California and has been for the past forty-eight hours. This is just now the news that is affecting prices all over the world. The drought on the slope was continued until Wednesday. It was as bad as any they had ever had out there and has set people to buying wheat all over creation. As California wheat cuts almost as much of a figure at Liverpool as wheat sent from Atlantic ports the prospect of a rained crop affected Liverpool nearly as if Minnesota and Dakota had been sufferers instead of California. The situation became so exciting that there was even a little corner in California wheat at Liverpool. Moveover, the drought was probably the thing that set the clique at work that is said to be backed by the Bank of Nevada. When the alarm over this California rain famine was at its height and when everybody buying on it was loaded, water suddenly became very plentiful on the Pacific coast. The result is natural enough. Cables to-day said wheat was a penny lower at Liverpool. At Chicago wheat was down to 84c for May and the feeling was very weak. Wheat was dull and oniet and Mecovers the range of the day The closings were duplicates of those at adjournment yesterday. The offerings were not large, but kept pace with requirements. There was a report of a drop in consols, which stiffened prices for a time. May sold at 84@84%c, starting at 84 and closing at 84%c. February closed at 77%c, March at 78%c.
