Grand Island's Enterprise.

GRAND ISLAND, March 12 .- [Corresoondence of the BEE |-Grand Island, going on the principle we see advocated in the BEE for Omaha, is putting some thing substantial into its boom in the way of manufactures and home enterprises, and is not beating the air with real estate deals in which there is no subsistence and which puts any town that depends entirely on this windmill work constantly on the verge of a reaction that when it does come will leave hundreds of suckers holding the bag for enipes that have flown. Grand Island will have this year the soldiers' home, a college, a canning factory, a barb wire factory, a foundry on a large scale, and good prospects for a twine factory, a galvanized iron cornice factory and a starch factory. On these the rapid growth of the town is based and is much more substantial than the foolish inflation of real estate prices that are not sustained by common sense or the actual present worth. Property is not always worth what is paid for it and when many are let down at a time by the receding of real estate values a panic follows that does more harm than the receding boom did good. Messrs Archer and Haas visited our

city on Tuesday and completed all arrangements for the canning factory and work will be commenced at once to erect a three-story brick building 48x120 and a wing attached to this 36x100, two stories high, with large process room and boiler room and husking room 36x120 and will be a plant, including buildings, real estate and working capital, a \$100,000 investment. It will employ a great many people and be one of the big enterprises

Busy Days at Sutton. SUTTON, Neb., March 12 .- [Correspon-

dence of the BEE. ]-This has been one of the busiest days of the season for Sutton. Hundreds of farmers were in town selling hogs and grain. The great reduction in rates since the arrival of the Kansas City & Omaha railroad at this point hat caused a general advance to farmers on all their produce. The rate from here to Chicago on corn has been reduced 10 cents, and on some kinds of stock the rate has been reduced \$20 per car. The general activity in business and the prospect of several new enterprises has caused an unusual activity in real estate. Seven new additions have been opened up and corner lots are eagerly picked up by the shrewd business man. Clark's addition west was opened up

Fowler, which is to be a \$15,000 brick, and when completed will be one of the handsomest in the state. One of the most important deals of the last few days is the purchase of the Sutton roller mills of J B. Dinsmore by Samuel Conn, a capitalist formerly of Champaign, Ill. A new lumber yard was started this week by a Mr. Bishop, late of Wisconsin. It is rumored that a second national bank will be opened for business some time this month. There are already three banks

The more pretentious buildings contemplated will be commenced when spring is really opened. Several fine store buildings and residences are contracted and material being got on the ground ready for work. FREMONT, Neb., March 12.-[Correspondence of the BEE.]-Fremont is at the present time enjoying a degree of growth and prosperity never before experienced, and is perhaps leading all the cities of the second class in Nebraska-The brisk revival of trade began about six months ago, but is just beginning to materalize and give some indication of what is really coming. During the past two weeks 300 acres of land adjoining the city on three sides have been purchased and will be laid out in four additions. Residence lots have increased 50 per cent in value, and many business lots have loubled during the past month; tenement houses and store rooms are in good de-mand and cannot be supplied; railroad graders seeking sub-contracts fill the town, and a general air of activity and oustle prevails everywhere.
