

ARMY RETIREMENT AGAIN.

A Continuation of the List Compiled by General Brisban for the Bee.

FROM 1801 TO 1868 INCLUSIVE

Interesting Military Information—When Army Officers of all Branches of the Service Will be Excused from Duty.

Fort Robinson, Neb., March 4.—To the Editor of the BEE: The list of retirements was not forthcoming at the date named as no doubt many of your readers who are interested in such matters observed. It was simply impossible to get the matter together and have it corrected in time. It is now however, complete and one year beyond the time promised. The list promised was from 1801 to 1868, and you will perceive that the present list enclosed herewith is from 1801 to 1868 inclusive. The reason for this change is that I had intended publishing a list of retirements which would take place after 1868, but I shall not now do so. No retirement list after 1868 would be of any value. It is hard to tell who will be alive in 1910 or 1920, and no doubt the casualties from death and other causes will far exceed those from retirements. No retirement list beyond 1868 or 1869 is therefore valuable. I have the retirements up to 1867, though the list is not by any means complete. I may or I may not publish it some day, but the retirements from 1867 to 1868 I think are all any one will wish to have and these have now all been published in the BEE.

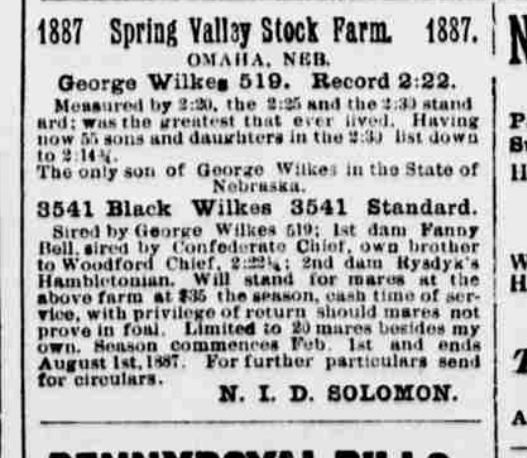
