A man named Peter Van Buren, aged about forty-five years, was the defendant in a case in which it was sought to prove that he is a spendthrift and should be placed in charge of a guardian. One of the leading witnesses was G. W. Mellinger, a justice of the peace at Firth, where also Van Buren resides. He testified that he had frequently seen Van Buren under the influence of drink, and was severely cross-examined by Mr. Burr. his neighbors to such a degree that it was
supposed he was no longer able to control himself. A short time ago he
received a pension of \$1,800 and since
that time he has been in receipt of a
monthly pension of about \$12. It is

The petition to have Van Buren deprived of his right to care for himself is sought to be removed on the strength of a petition signed by about thirty people residing near him. A nearly analogous case was found yesterday before the board of insanity. An old man, full of vigor, leading the life of a bachelor on a farm near Woodlawn, was charged with being insane by a neighbor named Otto Webb. The latter formerly kept a saloon in this city, and it seems that between him and the old man the best of feeling does not exist. Wood claims that at times when he is Wood claims that at times when he is out shots come very near him from Webb's gun, and Webb says that whenever he fires his gun if Moore is at home, the latter seizes his gun and fires out of the house in the direction whence comes the sound of Moore's shot. The old man tells a straightforward tale and seems not to be at all disturbed by the accusation. The case against him was not a very strong one, and Webb seemed to favor a postponement till to-morrow to bring other witnesses. It is thought in yiew of the shooting which has already view of the shooting which has already transpired that a serious meeting may yet take place.




