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FINANCIAL.

New York, April 26.—[Special Telegram to the Bee.]—The condition of the New York stock market remains closely on general demoralization. The opening was weak, with declines of 1/2 to 3/4 per cent. London cables came in weak, foreign securities were 1/2 per cent lower, and advices from the French provinces were rather disappointing. London houses were free sellers of American securities and precipitated a sharp decline on the general list. The market appeared to be filled with stocks and the various pools were feeding out their holdings carefully, but the market being destitute of snap, and buyers scarce, they were unable to prevent a decline of 1/2 to 3/4 per cent. New England, which was the chief market of the decline, came to the front and was more largely traded than any other property and broke irregularly 1/2 per cent. The feeling became exceedingly nervous and after each depression sharp rallies followed, but were not maintained. The directors met to-day, and judging from the reports, it was far from harmonious. Victor Newcomb resigned, and S. V. White was elected to succeed him. The election of the good "deacon" not only had the temporary effect of staying the downward tendency, but caused a 1 point advance before 2 o'clock. It reports about New England are correct, the present outlook for good business is not very favorable and the condition of the road is not what it should be. After the speculative directors who sold out get through hammering the market and get it to 50, as some predict, they will probably say their talk was for effect and that the road is all right. Whether they see their success in making the public swallow their stories remains to be seen. The only stocks showing any strength were Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, which advanced 1/2 per cent; Mil-

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
