MARKING A MILESTONE.

The First Baptist Church Starts Out on a New Year With Bright Prospects. REV. DR. COOLEY'S SERMON.

The New Fire Alarm Gets Two Practical Tests Yesterday—Brief Bits of News Found Flying About in Yesterday's Wind—Personal.

A Church Anniversary. Yesterday morning Rev. Dr. Crooley preached an anniversary sermon at the First Baptist church, of which he has been pastor for two years. Those who are familiar with the religious history of the city need not be reminded that this church has had a hard struggle. In the earlier years of its existence it worked hard and overcame many obstacles. At last it had a fine church building, in the very heart of the city, the society seemed gaining in numbers and strength, and brighter days seemed in store.

There were two fire alarms turned in yesterday afternoon. The first one was caused by the burning of the rubbish on the vacant square opposite Horn's park. Shortly after the fire department returned to their houses, an alarm from box 21 came in. The department made the run up South First street to Gralum avenue, and found the underbrush in Fairmont park on fire, and had to return to Pierce street and go up through Park avenue to reach it. After it was discovered that no immediate danger was liable to occur, company No. 4 was left to look after it in case it was necessary to lay the hose, while the others returned to their homes.

Two years ago I commenced my labor as pastor of this church. The text of my first sermon was the memorable words of Paul to the Corinthians—'For I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ and him crucified.' By that discourse I aimed to strike the key note of my ministry in this city. God knows and I know, and you doubtless know, that the succeeding notes have not been always in harmony; the time has not been altogether sustained, but yet I can call God to witness that I have aimed to preach a crucified Christ as the only hope, and as the only ground of confidence for the christian.

The speaker then recorded some of the blessings and the marks of progress. The numbers of members had been nearly tripled. Alienations and differences had been removed, and where they could not see alike they had silently agreed to forget. There had been no great gatherings, ten being the largest number received of one time, but there had been continual accessions. There were only two or three young persons in the church when he came. Now there was a host of them, full of promise and vigor. They were not only a great present help, but the future of the church was with them.

Dr. Crooley presented the following facts and figures: There had been fifty-one received into membership during the past year, three by baptism, seven by entrance and twenty-one by letter. The present membership was 165, as compared with only 57 two years ago. The pastor had preached 119 sermons, attended 129 prayer and religious meetings, made 426 visits, attended 13 sessions of the Sunday school, and solemnized 15 marriages. There had been raised for all purposes about \$1,700.

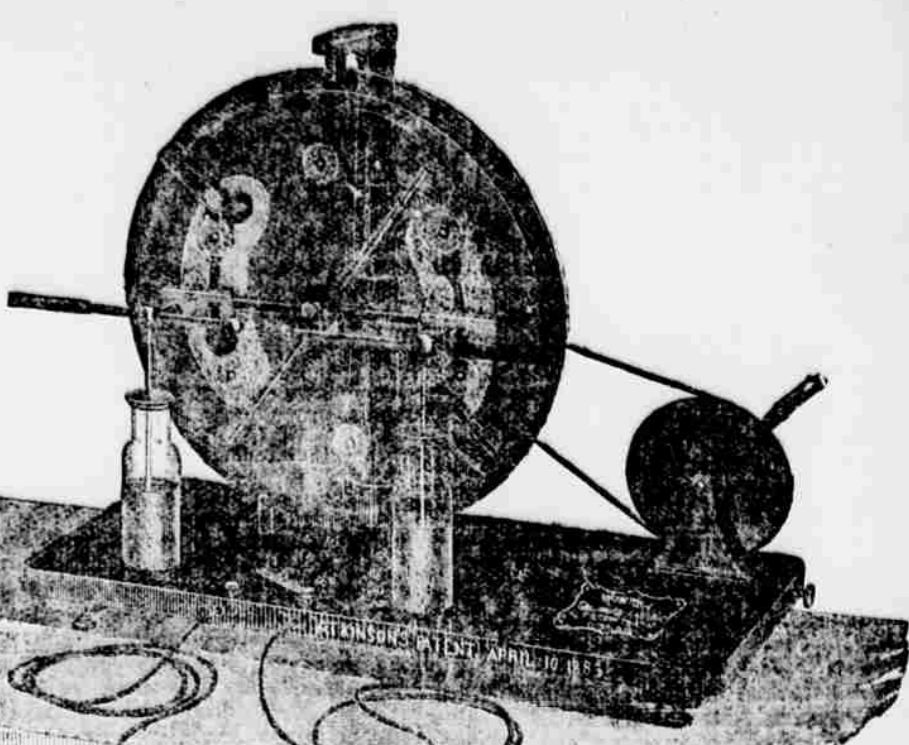
