NOT MUCH WHEAT WANTED.

CORN MARKET DULL

The Provision Pit Shows a Slight Gain in Strength-The Hog

Quotations. CHICAGO PRODUCE MARKET.

Business Brisk-General

CHICAGO, May 20 .- | Special Telegram to the BEE. |-June wheat was pegged at 88c to-day during the long session. The prices fluctuated between 87%; and 88%; inside figures being touched a few minutes before 1 o'clock. There was very little business done below 88c, however, and there was only moderate trading in the option. For a market in which a 50,000,000 bushel short interest has been extensively advertised it is really astonishing how little wheat is wanted at this juncture. The bulk of speculative business was in the latter futures, July being the favorite wanted and August and December ranking next in point of speculative popuiarity. July, which four days ago sold at a discount of 3e under June, approached to within Me of the latter month at one time this forenoon, though the difference averaged 14c most of the day. Trading in July was general and large. Indications pointed to purchases of heavy individual or clique lines. It was floor gossip that Galveston and California were again in the market on a very large scale. A tip was given out that before the end of the month July would command a natural premium over June, but that the latter option would be pushed up into line instead of June being les down, as was the case last month. The 1 o'clock range was 88c for June, 86%c for July and 84%c for August, Crop reports from the winter wheat field are in the main encouraging, but advices from the northwest indi-cate the existence of a feeling of growing salarm among producers over the prospect. Spring wheat is very liable to suffer from the hot weather, which is forcing the plant before the roots have had a chance to spread, thus causing spindling growth. The hot weather seems to have arrived ten days or two weeks earlier than usual in the northwest.

two weeks earlier than usual in the northwest.

Corn was dull and steady. The movement from the interior is only moderate and depletion of visible stocks is going on rapidly. Very little importance can yet attach to field news concerning corn, though more or less of it is floating around. The tone of the market to-day was one of firmness. Fluctuations were within moderate limits and the change of prices to be noted is in the direction of improvement. June ranged at 39%c low and 39%@39%c high, resting at 39%c at 1 o'clock. The range for July was 40%@41%c and the 1 o'clock price was 41@41%c. There was a small-sized flurry in oats, which carried the price of June from 29c to 25%c and July from 27%c to 27%c. The excitement that was occasioned by crop reports did not last. The 1 o'clock range was 20%c for June and 27%c for July.

In provisions there was a better showing of strength. Business failed to show any improvement or give promise of any increase right away, but in the general market improvement or give promise of any increase right away, but in the general market the feeling was unquestionably more favorable for holders, who were influenced by the advance in hors on the face of good receipts to show less desire to sell. Offerings of all descriptions of product, and for cash and future delivery, were comparatively moderate under the circumstances, and though quiet, trade was pervaded by a strong tone. Prices also averaged higher than yesterday all around, and based on last night's closings. The advance at 1 oclock was fully 50c on pork, 2½c on lard and 2½co. on short ribs. June, July and August were again favorite futures. The day's light trading appeared to be largely on account of scalpers.

Afternoon Session.—Wheat was steady; June 38c, July 503c, August sold at 84%c. Corn was dull but steady; June 39c, bid, July 41c bid, August 42c bid. Oats were steady. Pork sold for year delivery at \$13.023c; for cash, May and June the market was nominal, \$22.75 being openly bid for May. Lard was strong and closed at \$6.673c for May, \$6.70 for June, \$6.80 for July and \$6.873c for August.
