

CHICAGO LIVE STOCK

CHICAGO, May 25.- (Special Telegram to the BEE.]-CATTLE.-Out of the 10,000 head of fresh cattle there were at least 3,000 Texans, leaving only an average supply of natives. Yet this fact did not seem to have any effect on the sale of native stock. The British markets are largely against American shippers, and the home demand is not up to the March production, and prices are the lowest since 1879. Native butchers' stock, unless the very finest cows and heifers, were sold at low prices. The stocker and feeder trade re-mains quiet. The big run of veal calves noted yesterday was dis-posed of at all sorts of prices. NEW YORK, May 25 .-- [Special Telegram to the BEE.|-STOCKS-There was very little snap to the stock market to-day, and outside St. Paul & Duluth and Peoria, Decatur & Evansville prices were generally maintained very close to the opening figures. St. Paul & Duluth gained 6% per cent before noon, mak-ing a total gain of about 16 per cent this week. About the only point which has been made public is that a scheme is on foot to retire the preferred stock and give dividends which have heretofore been paid to preferred stockholders to common stock. Some of the heaviest traders were buyers above 80 to-day, and the talk was that the stock would sell much higher. The whole market opened rather firm, but later almost everything eased off. St. Paul was held very steady around 83 and there was some talk that Armour was picking it up at that figure. The news from Chicago regarding the situation among the Granger roads was less belligerent than for several days, and the opinion towards the close began to gain ground that the rate war was not such a serious matter after all.
