The board of equalization did no business yesterday, simply adjourning to this evening. There will be a house full to-night of those who protest against their assessments being raised.

The procession was a large and worthy one. It was the best parade ever made here on Decoration day. The marchers, and aides, uniformed and mounted, made a fine appearance as leaders. The police appeared on foot, and in uniform. Then came the Wall Guards' drum corps, without which no patriotic doings would be complete. The Lincoln post, No. 29, G. A. R., and Veteran Legion camp, No. 8, together with visiting veterans formed the most interesting feature of the procession.

The speaker paid a glowing tribute to the loyal steel-converted husbands, brothers and lovers went forth to battle.

Sixteen Years Change. A correspondent of the Herald, published at Hagerstown, Maryland, in a lengthy communication to this paper setting forth the details of the boom in this city, says: Sixteen years ago I made a visit to Council Bluffs, the city on the Missouri river which has been so much talked of recently throughout the country. It was then the phenomenal boom which had taken place in an overgrown country town, with an unpleasant dash of western provincialism about it that made it a great curiosity about exposing himself on unoccupied street corners. Today I find it a bustling thirty city, in metropolitan dress and habits. Miles and miles of paved streets lead past imposing business blocks and magnificent public buildings and into the heart of the town. The city is now a city of some 15000 people, and constantly reaching out and subjugating new territory to this new mistress.

The Humpback to be Replaced. Humpback bridge is to be replaced with a new one and that very shortly. This more will be received, by those interested in the future of Lake Manawa, with delight. County Supervisor Underwood yesterday stated to a representative of the BEE that he has let the contract for the new bridge, and it will be twenty feet wide with two drive-ways, separated in the center with rail, and on either side to aid the bridge contractors were compelled to send away for bridge timbers and that as soon as they arrived work would begin immediately. Road Supervisor Wright of Lewis township has agreed to attend to the widening of the roadway and will in all probability not begin until the bridge is completed. It is suggested that it would facilitate matters if Mr. Wright would begin the grading of the road previous to the building of the bridge and in that case, as soon as the bridge is completed the new road would be in shape without further delay.
