The Milwaukee bridge company will begin work on the bridge on the road to Lake Manawa to-day. The work will be done as quickly as possible, but will obstruct travel for about three days.

C. R. Allen, the map publisher, has gone east in the interests of his new maps of this city, and the copy will be ready for distribution.

The California fruit season has opened here, the first shipment being received last Sunday. The shipment consisted of oranges, blackberries, plums, apricots, peaches, cherries, pears, etc., a variety from which the most capacious epicure could satisfy himself.

Some heavy machinery is being filed on the building lately erected here by the John Durks Corn Harvester company. The lumbermen are the ones seeking this to secure themselves. The matter will probably be speedily adjusted.

A little son of Dr. Powell, of Glenwood, yesterday fell from a hay mow to the heavy plank floor below, striking squarely on his head.
